A Hong Kong telegram says: "Capt. Francis Henry May, superintendent of the Hong Kong police, who, it was reported, had been captured by the Chinese, has arrived here unmoiested. The government does not apprehend any trouble in taking over the Kow Loon hinterland.

DEATH OF A LIBERAL M. P. London, April 5 .- Thomas Edward Ellis, advanced Liberal, member of parliament for Monmouthshire and chief opposition whip, is dead. He was born in 1859. Mr. Ellis was junior lord of the treasury and parliamentary charity commissioner in 1892-94 was parliamentary secretary to the treasury and chief ministerial whip from March, 1894 to June, 1895, and after the election of 1895 was chief whip of the Liberal opposition.

THE POPE'S CONDITION. The bulk of the Redmondites were therefore absent, but Timothy Harrington was present, and elected to the chair. Timothy M. Healy, Timothy D. Sullivan and Timothy J. Healy sat with anti-Parnellites. John Dillon moved, and Michael Davitt seconded, resolutions regretting the absence of the bulk of the Parnellites, which, it was pointed out, would make reunion impossible, favoring the reconstitution of the old Parnellite party, as it existed from 1885 to 1890, and declaring readiness, as an earnest of practical exemplification of the spirit of the anti-Parnellites, to support a Parnellite for first chairman of the party. The resolutions were adopted, though there was a slight dissent at the last proposal. AGAINST RHODES.

RECKLESS NAVIGATION. London, April 5 .- At the inquest which is to be held shortly on the victims of the wreck of the steamer Stella on the Casquet Rocks, March 30, it is expected to prove that the disaster was due to reckless navigation. Col. Dixon, one of the survivors, says that some time before the steamer struck he ask-ed Capt. Reeks if they would arrive on time.
