SNAPPING TURTLE HOLDS UP MAIL

The Postoffice Clerks Leap on Tables to Escape Clashing Jaws.

Middletown, N. Y., Aug. 30.—When a big snapping turtle, in an ugly mood, suddenly appeared in the postoffice today, it created more excitement than would have been caused by the visit of an inspector. It was thought somebody had put it in a bag and sent it by mail.

The turtle wandered around among the mail bags, peering in as though trying to read the postal cards, and was finally sighted by one of the clerks who was sorting mail. With a yell he jumped on the table and pointed to the door.

After watching the two clerks it had treed the big turtle blinked a time or two and then solemnly walked over to the general delivery window.

"Wow!" yelled the clerk there and using the letter boxes as a scaling ladder soon reached the top of the room. "It's barking like a dog," the general delivery clerk shouted to the money order clerk.

The snapper snapped its jaws together a time or two, making a sound like the closing of a vault door, took a couple of mouthfuls out of an oak post and was just about to bite open the safe when a negro porter came in.

BRYAN ACCLAIMED AS NEXT PRESIDENT

The Great Democrat Met by Monster Delegation Upon Return to New York.

New York, Aug. 29.—Bronzed by the suns of many climes during a year of travel around the world, William J. Bryan, of Nebraska, steamed up New York Bay this afternoon on the steamer Princess Irene, and received an ovation from large welcoming parties which went down to quarantine to meet the distinguished passenger.

Mr. Bryan did not enjoy his usual health during the voyage, but he was much better today. He was fatigued when he boarded the steamer and during the entire voyage suffered from indigestion.

Mr. Bryan will not land in New York city proper until tomorrow afternoon, when he will be received at the Battery by delegations of prominent Democrats from all parts of the country. He was taken off the Princess Irene shortly after the vessel had anchored in quarantine.

First he went aboard two tugs which had been chartered by "Bryan's Nebraska home folks," where he was greeted and hailed as the next president. He then went aboard the yacht Illini and was taken to the landing of the Ocean Yacht Club at Stapleton, S. I., where he landed and was whirled away in an automobile to the home of Lewis Nixon, "Ben Braw," on the Heights of Tompkinsville, where he will spend the night.

Mr. Bryan was accompanied by his wife and daughter, Miss Grace Bryan. Mr. Bryan could not be drawn into a discussion of political questions today.

"What I have to say of politics at this time and with my incomplete knowledge of affairs at home will be said tomorrow night at the Madison Square Garden reception," Mr. Bryan told the press.

Asked pointedly regarding the probability of his candidacy, Mr. Bryan said he had nothing to add to the letter he wrote former Senator J. K. Jones, of Arkansas, in which he said he might accept a third nomination under conditions which he named.

MADE A MUDDLE OF THEIR CASE ONE DOWAGER WHO DEFIES KAISER

Woman Suffragists of England Cripple Cause. Mother of Cecilie Determined to See Her Daughter.

ARE NOT REAL SUFFRAGISTS ALTHOUGH EMPEROR FORBIDS

Recent Disgraceful Outbreak Has Undone the Work Accomplished by More Level-Headed Women.

London, Aug. 29.—In the one short hour since her advent the Amazing Suffragette has made whirlpool of the women's movement in England. Whether it will prove to be the ultimate acceleration of the current or to its harmful deflection is a point on which a diversity of opinion exists.

For the suffragettes, those women who have been actively concerned in the present lawless demonstrations, are not representative of the large body of organized—one might say the legitimate—women's suffrage societies, with whom, on the contrary, they have refused to act, complaining of the slow progress made during the forty or fifty years of life and their too conservative methods. They are chiefly members of the Women's Social and Political Union, an organization largely drawn from the ranks of the Independent Labor party, an industrial association.

How the Tumult Arose. The suffragette chose for her demonstration in the House of Commons what apparently is regarded by many leaders of the women's suffrage organization as the crucial moment in the history of the suffrage movement. They had a house with a larger number of members (mainly Liberals), than ever before, pledged to the favorable consideration of women's suffrage. Mr. Keir Hardie, the most active male champion that the cause has, had presented his resolution, the clause relating to women's suffrage being as follows:

"In all acts relating to the qualification and registration of voters or persons entitled or claiming to be registered and to vote in the election of members of Parliament, wherever the same shall be held to include women for all purposes connected with and having reference to the right to be registered as voters and to vote in such election, any law or usage on the contrary notwithstanding."

This resolution, the suffragettes, many of them, declare was lost to them by the action of the suffragettes, whose wild outbreak behind the grille in the women's gallery during the speech of Mr. Evans necessitated their removal, and thoroughly alienated the sympathy and interest of the favorable House—women of the order that could stand any damping. Several members publicly announced their change of heart, saying that whereas they had intended to cast their votes in favor of the resolution they would under no circumstances do so after their deliberations on the subject in the women's gallery, which they must regard as a warning and typical of general feminine ignorance of legislative procedure.

This, their most daring appearance, was by no means the debut of the suffragettes. Their campaign of agitation was begun about seven months ago, and since that time they have been incessantly busy in ways consistently wasteful and unpleasant. They have disturbed public meetings, persecuted members of the Government, and generally, publicly reviled and anathematized men who express no sympathy with the "forward" movement, with epithets peculiarly imaginative. And they have instituted at their meetings three hoots for their "enemies" or "traitors" who have not followed their lead.

They have also attempted the wounding of personal violators in the public form of face slapping and shin kicking, but he it said that they have in public speeches, threatened more serious personal attacks, and once, at least, they have attempted the traditional horse-whipping as an argument against being ejected from a meeting which they wished to break up.

Miss Emily Davies, whose name has been associated most prominently with women's suffrage for many years, was compelled to write an open letter to the Tribune, denying the statement of the suffragettes that "she is living pioneer of the women's suffrage cause. Mrs. Emily and Miss Davies, who presented the first petition to John Stuart Mill, have considered themselves heart and soul in sympathy with the present agitation, if the "lawless action" referred to in the suffragettes' statement is taken into account. (This statement of Miss Davies, by the way, has been incorporated into a pamphlet for distribution. The suffragettes for the last year have considered themselves very near the goal. Opposition, indifference, ridicule, and the successful operation of women's suffrage in English colonies, namely, New Zealand, South and West Australia, New South Wales, Tasmania and Queensland, has made many converts to the "forward" in this regard is not altogether encouraging.

Declares She Will Force Her Way Through, and the Kaiser Will Back Down to Avoid Scandal.

Berlin, Aug. 29.—Braving the anger of the Kaiser, who distinctly has made her understand that her presence in Berlin was not wanted at any time, Grand Duchess Anastasia of Mecklenburg-Schwerin, the mother of Crown Princess Cecilie, the other day suddenly arrived from Cannes and took room in a hotel in the Unter den Linden like any ordinary traveler.

Although she has been here for more than a week and her presence is known to all Berlin, she has not received any communication from the imperial palace or a visit from her daughter, who is at Potsdam with her baby, only a few miles away.

The grand duchess, however, has declared that she will not go away until she has seen her grandson, and it is safe to bet that she will force her way through even if she has to use threats to do so. The Kaiser is too much afraid of the scandals she might make to oppose her beyond a certain point.

The Kaiser has added a new leaf to his wealth of laurels. Already known as a composer, he has now, like the great Richard Wagner, discovered a talent in a young man who he is sure will surpass all living opera singers.

During his recent visit to the Krupp villa, at Essen, he was, of course, serenaded by the local "maennerchor" and was struck by the exquisite tenor voice of one of the serenaders.

He immediately went for the singer, a young man named Moeller, whom he told that he would pay for his trial out of his own pocket and see that he was engaged by the director of the court opera.

Moeller is now in this city taking lessons from a celebrated vocal teacher and will probably be heard here this fall.

The announcement of Miss Isadora Duncan's secret marriage to young Mr. Craig, the son of Ellen Terry, the famous English actress, did not surprise the people of Berlin, because it was an open secret nearly a year ago that the barefoot dancer entered the state of matrimony in September last, and that she is now expecting an important event at the seaside resort in Holland, where she is spending the summer with her husband.

Miss Krupp's Victory. Although he was exceedingly angry at Bertha Krupp when she followed the dictates of her heart and became engaged to Dr. Gustav von Eshelen and Halbach, former secretary to the minister of the Vatican, the Kaiser has now relented and declared himself very well satisfied with the match. Miss Bertha was not very much worried when told that her choice did not please her imperial lord, and said she felt sure she should make him change his opinion, and really when the Kaiser last week visited Villa Huegel, the residence of the Krupp family, and again told his favorite daughter of his old friend, her charms brought about a change almost immediately.

CHICAGO'S POLICE SCANDAL

Inspector Engaged Experts to Burglarize Jewelry Stores.

Chicago, Aug. 29.—The further Police Chief Collins goes in his investigations of Inspector Lavin's actions while he was in charge of the south side district, the more complicated they become.

Chief Collins has the affidavit of ex-Policeman Mahoney that Lavin induced Mahoney to procure burglars to ransack a jewelry store. Mahoney says he got three men to do "the job," and their booty was taken to Mahoney's house and then to Lavin's. He declares that Lavin gave some of the stolen jewelry to lawyers to defend two of the burglars. Both these men were subsequently killed by policemen.

The Anti-Crime League has evidence of two other such cases. Chief Collins is preparing charges against two captains whom he has retired, and the league will file charges against eight lieutenants.
