McCallum made two reports of offences of this kind to the committee at its last meeting, and one of the offenders was able to convince the committee that he had offended through accident and not by design. The other was ordered to appear at the next meeting to show cause. Inspector McCallum has since made two other seizures, and the two dealers concerned either will have to show that they were innocent of dishonest intent or face prosecutions.

Several lots of short-weight butter also nave been found by the inspector within the last few days, and prosecutions are expected in some of these cases also. In one case, a woman who had purchased three reputed pounds of butter discovered, on weighing them that they were short in the aggregate by nearly three-quarters of a pound, and she at once laid the facts before Mr. McCallum, who has undertaken to lay a complaint if she will furnish the evidence. She has kept the butter unopened, and says she will be prepared to produce it in court as she received it from the vendor.


