J. M. Kinnear of Sussex Re-Elected President at Annual Meeting in Moncton Yesterday—A Dwelling House Burned

Moncton, N. B., March 9.—The annual meeting of the New Brunswick Postmasters' Association was held here this afternoon. A large number of postmasters were present from different parts of the province. J. M. Kinnear, president of Sussex, occupied the chair. Officers for the ensuing year were elected as follows: J. M. Kinnear, vice-president; J. V. Bourque, Shediac, secretary-treasurer; executive committee, D. S. Mann, Petticoat; G. D. Steeves, Hillsboro; G. H. Seacord, Annapolis; G. M. Gannon, Salisbury; J. F. Allison, Sackville; provincial representative of central committee, J. V. Bourque.

Ira Stratton, grand secretary of Stone-wall, Manitoba, was present and outlined the work of the association, referring to matters to be taken up with the post office department in the near future. The financial relations of the postmasters, better labelling of newspapers passing through the mails, promotion in the service, and allowing the increase to postmasters in the year in which they were earned. The dwelling house owned and occupied

by James O'Brien on Shediac road, nine miles from Moncton, was destroyed by fire this afternoon, together with most of the furniture and family clothing. The fire originated in the upper part of the house, presumably from the chimney. There was no insurance, and the loss will probably amount to \$2,000, which will be severely felt by Mr. O'Brien.

William Butler, son of Seth Butler, died at the home of his father in Sackville this afternoon, following injury sustained in the I. C. R. shops here about Jan. 1. Butler was taken to his home two months ago, and has been unable to work since. Deceased was about thirty years old, and unmarried.
