The Secretary in his letter gives the following resumé of the Society's operations during the year. He says:—

"It cannot be otherwise than a source of real gratification and thankfulness to every true lover of his Bible to find that from year to year the efforts of the Society, whose one single aim is to diffuse that Bible in the varied languages of the earth, among all people, kindreds and tribes, are meeting with increased success; and that there is no deminution in the desire felt to become possessed of a treasure, which, while it reveals man's fallen state by nature, at the same time proclaims a Saviour who came into the world to die, that perishing sinners might live.

"During the year just closed, the Society has again had many proofs that the work which it is carrying on is accompanied by a rich blessing from a covenant God. Whether we regard the state of the Society's funds, or the amount of work which it has been the means of accomplishing, there is every reason to thank God, and to push onward with our labours with renewed courage.

In France, upwards of 91,000 copies have been put into circulation in connection with our general work, in addition to 169,000 copies, mostly portions which were sold or distributed on the occasion of the Universal Exhibition in Paris, and our agent supplies us with many facts showing the increased desire which is now manifested by Roman Catholics in all parts of the country to become acquainted with the truths of the Gospel. A specially interesting work of Scripture circulation continues to be carried on among the men of the French army, which is aided and promoted by not a few of the superior officers.
