JOSEPH H. COLE DEAD

Native of Sackville, N.B., Passes Away in Woburn

Joseph H. Cole, a building mover expert of national reputation, died at his home in Woburn, Mass., on Tuesday after an illness of four months.

Mr. Cole was born in Sackville, N.B., on Nov. 9, 1851, son of Martin and Cynthia (Barnes) Cole. He went to the United States in 1872, settling in Malden. Two years later he went to Woburn and became superintendent for Mr. Ellis & Co., building movers.

General Benson Makes Announcement—Halifax to be Used

The first definite announcement of the plans of the remount department for supplying horses for the imperial army was made this morning by General Sir Frederick Benson, head of the department in Canada. The plans call for the Halifax as a remount depot, but the work carried on here.

When the shipments commencing Sir Frederick expects to see a total of 3,000 horses a week handled at the two ports. It is against the policy of the department to say anything about the dates of the shipments, but it is understood that the work will commence at this port soon and that it will last for a considerable period of time.

Speaking of the local facilities, Sir Frederick said this morning that he found the arrangements at the exhibition grounds admirably suited for the work and that the modern like stock buildings were quite the best for the purpose that he had ever seen. RUSSIANS WIP OUT BATTALION OF CZECHS London, Oct. 8.—A Reuter despatch to the Exchange Telegraph Company states that a message from Budapest, announces the almost complete annihilation of an Austrian battalion of Czechs, in a fierce encounter with the Russians during the latter's advance on Marnas-ro-Siret. It is said that every soldier in the battalion was either killed or wounded.

In South Africa London, Oct. 8.—The doctrine of Herzogism in South Africa, standing as it does for the back-veiled and irreconcilable Boers, and the moderate Free State commandants, who fought against England in the late war, have professed their services to the Hon. Louis Botha. This, following the break-up of the Paarlshoorn meeting opposing the government's action, practically assures the union government the general support of the people of South Africa, irrespective of race.
