SPECIAL CLASSES FOR MENTALLY RETARDED PUPILS

Matter Considered by the School Board—Question of Teachers' Training—Applications Received.

A regular meeting of the Board of School Trustees was held last evening with Hon. H. A. McKeown presiding. The matter of special classes for the mentally retarded was taken up and it was reported that the cost of training a teacher at the Harvard summer school would amount to a little less than \$160. The joint committee of the board and of the Board of Health had not been able to fix on who was responsible for this expense. It was decided to put the matter in the hands of the committee again for a further report. H. Colby Smith reported that it had been decided to call the new school in the West Side the New Albert school.

Colonel A. B. Snow, cadet superintendent for New Brunswick, sent the finding of the military court of inquiry into the loss of cadet rifles from school buildings. The finding was that the school board was responsible for payment for the loss. No action was taken.

Applications for positions on the teaching staff were received from the following: Miss M. J. Laby, Fredericton; Miss Florence L. Murray, Fredericton; Miss Gertrude Z. Lewis, Campbellton; L. P. Steeves, Fredericton; Stanley S. Neeson, for the principalship of the Albert school; Miss Marion R. Smith and Miss Marion G. Patterson, for positions as household science teachers; J. B. Young, of St. John's, Nfld., as manual training teacher. The invitation of the St. John Teachers' Association asking the trustees to attend an entertainment this week was accepted.

The request of Alexandra Chapter, I. O. D. E., to be allowed to present a set of framed I. O. D. E. war memorial pictures to Alexandra school was granted, with thanks.

The report of the secretary showed 6,801 pupils enrolled; belonging, 8,551 pupils, 4,217 boys, 4,334 girls, percent belonging in average daily attendance, 90.19.

The health report showed seventeen cases of measles; two of diphtheria, one of whooping cough and three of scarlet fever. Mr. Leavitt also reported forty-six teachers had been ill during the month.

LOCAL NEWS

John Rice, charged with keeping liquor in his bar shop in North Main street, pleaded guilty to the charge yesterday afternoon in the police court and paid his fine of \$200.

Willard Foster was found guilty yesterday afternoon in the police court on a charge of tampering with a witness. As he already faces a sentence of six months for violation of the liquor laws the magistrate decided to let the sentences run concurrently. Adrian Gilbert appeared for Foster and W. M. Ryan conducted the prosecution.

Hon. J. G. Forbes, secretary-treasurer of the New Brunswick branch of the Canadian Patriotic Fund, has received word from Ottawa that the N. B. branch will be closed on June 30. Emergency relief will cease on April 30. There are at present fifty-five cases on the permanent list. The clerical work here has been done by Miss May Flett and Miss Gertrude Costley.

The Y. P. M. S. of St. David's church held a birthday social last evening in the school rooms. The program consisted of a play, "The Boy Who Cried Wolf," and musical selections were given by Mrs. J. M. Barnes, Miss Phyllis McGowan, Miss Jessie Jamieson, Miss H. MacGowan, Miss Doherty, Miss Bailey and Mrs. Dickie. Games and refreshments were enjoyed. The proceeds, for the society funds, amounted to \$27.50.

Mrs. C. E. Sanford presided and led the opening devotions at a meeting yesterday afternoon of the Century church. W. M. S. Miss Edna Austin had charge of the mission study period and was assisted by Mrs. Rothney McLaughlin, Mrs. J. Lawrence and Miss Bessie Comben. Miss Annie Hea gave the report of the Christian Science wardship work.
