FIRST EDITION. LE CANADIEN. PAYS A TRIBUTE TO SIR JOHN MACDONALD'S ABILITIES. Sir Leonard and Lady Tilly—Scottish Timber Merchants—Anxiety in Toronto Over the Premier's Condition. (SPECIAL TO THE GAZETTE.)

QUEBEC, June 2.—In an editorial this morning—Le Canadien, speaking about the illness of Sir John, says: "We will say with Archbishop Walsh, a most illustrious Canadian is on the brink of eternity. We have differed with him on political questions but we must admit his incomparable talent and the eminent services which he rendered to his country. May God spare him from too painful sufferings and grant him the reward due to his merits, but may his name be in peace!"

SCOTCH TIMBER MERCHANTS. QUEBEC, June 2.—Alex. MacArthur of Toronto and John and Malcolm Carwell of Glasgow, Scotland, timber merchants, have arrived in town from Toronto. They express the opinion that things have touched bottom and that trade is certain to improve. Indeed it is already improving. During the past week or two timber has been moving freely and a number of mills have been sold. They say far more ships could be taken up than they have already arrived.

THE BACCARAT TRIAL. THE SECOND DAY'S SCENE.—The Premier's Cross-Examination Continued. BY TELEGRAPH TO THE GAZETTE. LONDON, June 2.—The second day of the famous Baccarat trial commenced with an almost complete repetition of the scenes witnessed yesterday at the opening of the case. If anything, the trial for admittance to the court was greater than on Monday owing to the general impression that the Prince of Wales would take the stand today.

SIR CHARLES RUSSELL continued the cross-examination of the plaintiff. The witness related his statement that he had never ceased to deny the accusation made against him. He denied that he had said to Mr. Leavitt "You are not my witness" or "You are a liar."

A MILLION DOLLAR FINE. THE BROOKLYN COOPERAGE WORKS DESTROYED LAST NIGHT. BY TELEGRAPH TO THE GAZETTE.
