SEEKING REDUCTION IN EXPRESS RATES

Thomas G. Earl, the Fruit Grower, is Interesting Himself in the Matter.

Thomas G. Earl, of Lytton, one of the best known fruit men in this province, is in the city. He is making a tour of cess of those charged in the United States. Under the circumstances he points out that the fruit growers of British Columbia are severely handicapped. Owing to cheaper labor and other circumstances the growers in the adjoining states of the union are able to sell cheaper than the British Columbia producers. With lower expres rates the handicap is still greater. Mr. Earl will attempt to interest all dealers

and producers in the movement for better rates Speaking of conditions about Lytton he says that the fruit crop promises well in common with the conditions generally prevailing in the province. His own orchard, which now embraces forty-five acres, looks remarkably well. 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
