LONDON, Nov. 16.-The negotia LONDON, Nov. 16.—The negotiations between the governments of Great Britain and Nicargua with regard to the Mosquito coast have been very voluminous, but it is now believed the Micargua can provide a satisfuedory guaranteed for the protection of the ha-tives and enable Great Britain to rid herself of a responsibility which brings with it no advantage. The question of a suitable guarantee has been chiefly responsible for the prolongation of the matter. Lord Lansdowne, British for-eign secretary, insisting that the In-dians must be adequately protected. Beyond this point the foreign office displays little interest in the matter, believing that Great Britain's rights on the Mosquito coast are quite vahe-less, and no quid pro quo is being the Mosquito coast are quite s, and no quid pro quo is aght from Nicaragua.


