DR. MORISON HONORED.

All Creeds Unite in Good Wishes for His Success.

Rev. Dr. Morison, who leaves next Monday for Chicago to assume the pastorate of the first Presbyterian church of that city, was honored last evening by several presentations and addresses of esteem at a farewell meeting held in the lecture room of St. David's church. Peter Chisholm presided and among those on the platform were: Mayor White, Magistrate Ritchie, Judge Forbes, C. K. Cameron; the following members of St. Andrew's Society: T. A. Rankin (president), Rev. G. M. Campbell, B. R. Macaulay, J. Roy Campbell, Rev. D. J. Fraser, Rev. B. J. Rattee, John White, and Rev. Dr. Morison.

Dr. Morison was first presented with an address handsomely bound in morocco. Following this came a presentation of a cheque for \$200 by the trustees and congregation of St. David's church. Robert Reid presented certificates of life membership in the St. David's missionary association. Dr. and Mrs. Morison. Andrew Macdonald presented a similar certificate for Miss Josephine Morison.

Dr. Morison replied feelingly.

Telegrams were read from H. A. McKeown and C. J. Milligan, expressing regret at their inability to be present. Short speeches of appreciation of the work and character of Dr. Morison were made by Mayor White, Judge Ritchie, Judge Forbes and Rev. G. M. Campbell. T. A. 
