FORMER ST. JOHN MEN

Leonard and Frank Daley, Well Known Here Go Down to Death With Several Companions---Motor Boat Capsized Within a Few Feet of the Shore-Only One Man Saved.

TORONTO, Ont., July 26.—The launch Dalvine, containing ten young men from Toronto Junction, was capsized 300 yards west of High Park entrance about 2 o'clock this morning. Only one of the occupants, Geo. Shields, aged 20, of Vanhorne street, is alive. A dead body identified as Walter Dunin, aged 20, of Quebec awents, was found on the shore half a mile west at 5 o'clock this morning with the launch, and floating hisside it a coat that has been identified as belonging to Joseph Irwin, aged 28, of 68 Quebec avenue. The other eight who were in the boat at the time it. Apsized were John Irvine, aged 20, 75 Glendennan avenue; Frank Kyle aged 18, Union street; Leonard Daly, 49 Ontario street; Dawson Neilurgang, Gordon Leroche and Reginald Mullin. All are drowned.

About the time the accident is believed to have taken place there was a furlous thunderstorm, with bright light.

"Well, we had all been at the island and started to return home in the yacht Dalvine after midnight. About 1.30 o'clock we neared Sunnyside, our place of landing, when the storm came on. I think something then went wrong with the engine. Anyhow we were about 300 yards opposite the west gate of High Park, when, without any warning, the yacht capsized. We were all thrown into the water and I grabbed the boat. I clung to it, although at times I thought my strength would give out and I would have to go. I think I was in the water for about nine hours. When I got to the shore my body was so sore and I felt so tired that I lay on the ground for I don't know how long. Then I got up and crawled home."

JACK THE RIPPER" MURDERER STARTLES BERLIN WITH CRIMES

OF UNPARALLELED BRUTALITY

BERLIN, July 26—A series of coldbooded crimes, singularly resembling the "Jack-the-Ripper" murders, but for the fact that instead of women the victims were little girls, followed on another with remarkable celerity that safternoon almost in the centre of the city and aroused intense excitement and indignation.

Within a short time the assassin successfully enticed three girl bables, the oldest five years old, into doorways-follows and stabbed them several times in the abdomen with a sharp instrument. As a result one of the children is dead, another dying, and the third dangerously wounded.

The first knowledge of the crimes came when an occupant of the house at the corner of Ryke and Belforter streets found the body of Margariths and the lower part of the body horribly gashed. This was immediately reported to the police, who were about to proceed to investigate the case, when reports came that Hertha Lenst, aged three, and Elly Knishel, five years of age, had been found similarly outraged, but still alive, in Prenziauer allee and Hensersdorfer street, respectively.

The inhabitants of the neighborhood became intensely excited. Crowds gath-ered about the police station shouting vengeance against the murderer.
