WONDERS OF MODERN ALLOYING

GOLD AND SILVER.

Some of the most remarkable advances of recent science have been inconnection with the production of new alloys of well known metals by which new metals have been produced possessing extraordinary qualities.

For instance, it is commonly considered that magnetism is confined to iron—and to nickei in a lesser degree. Some wonderful alloys, however, have been and to feel the production of phosphorus to bronze had a considerable effect upon increasing the hardness, elasticity, and toughness of the alloy. In connection with this, a curious fact is, that the domes and other parts of locomotives made from oid, impure copper last much longer than those made from the pure copper now on the market.
