Saw Mutilated Remains Of Fellow Seamen-Personal Effects Of Victims Brought To City And Will Be Sent To Scotland—Ships Papers Not Recovered.

"I did not realize what a tragedy the wreck was until I was called upon to identify the bodies which were washed ashore," said John Mackenzie, the first survivor from the wreck of the Donaldson Line steamer Hestia to reach the city, who came across the bay in the steamer Yarmouth yester day and was interviewd by a Standard reported last evening.

He was the only survivor who was on deck when the steamer struck and the only one who could give a complete account of what occurred in board. He was taken to Yarmouth on the Lord Kitchener and assisted Second Engineer Morgan in identifying the bodies.

Ship's Papers Not Recovered.

"They were our comrades," said Mr.
Mackenzle "and it was hard to see their lifeless bodies, many disfigured and almost. unrecognizable. The waves had beaten their faces terribly. Captain Newman was not multilated though his face was discolored. The ship's papers were not found on him, and it is thought they were washed away. I attended the funeral service and I will never forget the lowering of the bodies into one large grave."
