

PRESIDENT OF CHINESE REPUBLIC EXPECTED TO MAKE HIMSELF THE PERMANENT CHIEF



The first Presidential election in China is to be held some time this year. There is a feeling that Yuan Shih-kai, the President, will arrogate to himself the powers of a dictator and the Republic will exist in name only.

The belief is almost general in the south that at present Yuan Shih-kai is engaged in the manoeuvre colloquially characterized as "playing 'possum'" pending his election as permanent President.

NOTED GERMAN PHYSICIAN TREATS OTTAWA PATIENTS

Dr. Friedmann inoculates Ten Tuberculosis Sufferers With Life Giving Serum—Tells Tuberculosis Society His Remedy Cures Ordinary Cases in Almost Every Instance.

Dr. Friedmann's methods were very precise and he lost no time in performing the necessary actions. Noticeable in the doctor's methods was the quickness with which he worked. The least sign of wavering by the attendants brought forth a sharp exclamation, and no sooner was one patient attended to than the next was ready for the next. He worked for the most part in silence and scarcely ever glanced at his audience. When the operation was finished there was no noticeable relaxation in his nervous manner. This was quite apparent when the injections were completed.

No criticisms of Dr. Friedmann's technique, such as were made in New York were advanced by the doctors present. The German physician was aided by two of his own assistants, while about the platform were grouped his audience. Among the latter were Dr. J. W. McCulloch, medical officer of health for Ontario, Dr. Friedrick Montzambert, director general of public health, Hon. Adam Beck of Toronto; Dr. J. A. Hodgkiss, of Ottawa; Dr. Adams, of Montreal, and others.

Previous to the clinic or demonstration Dr. Friedmann attended the opening session of the convention of the Canadian Association for the Prevention of Tuberculosis in the Russell Theatre, where he was received by Hon. Adam Beck, minister of power, and Ontario president of the association, and was introduced to His Royal Highness the Duke of Connaught, the Burrell General, and Hon. Martin Burrell, Canada's minister of agriculture.

The Duke of Connaught's Address.

In the course of a brief address, His Royal Highness said in advising the association of the course of the work, "I make no apology for repeating what I have already said on similar occasions, that is, that to win this campaign you must interest the public, and by constant and even wearisome reiteration impress on them the fact that the prevention of tuberculosis lies in their own hands, and that by the adoption of simple precautions of hygiene may save numbers of precious lives and prevent the loss to the development of the Dominion of thousands of hours of work."

Dr. Friedmann in addressing the convention, said: "The discovery, it becomes a well known and recognized fact that in the bacillus itself were to be found the substance which contains or produces the curative bodies. During these last twenty-three years all efforts were therefore directed toward the extracting and isolating the effective elements with different methods by chemical, thermic, mechanical and biological proceedings. But all previous methods for the preparation of remedies for tuberculosis originated from toxic virulent bacilli of the human or bovine tubercle and in spite of all efforts nobody succeeded in removing the avirulent and toxic of these cultures."

"Consequently it often occurred that the various tuberculous had a damaging or at least endangering effect upon

Peter J. McLellan.

Albert, N. B., Mar. 12.—Peter J. McLellan, well known farmer, stock raiser and lumberman, died at his home here at about midnight last night. The deceased, who was about 55 years of age, was the youngest son of the late Thomas McLellan and a nephew of ex-Lieut. Governor McLellan. The late Mr. McLellan is survived by two sons, John and William, and one sister, Lucy, all of this place.

The deceased, who was an enterprising farmer and stock raiser, entered the lumber business about twelve years ago, when he established two local mills, both of which have been running almost constantly ever since. He was a large circle of friends, and with consumption and in spite of all medical aid he passed away last night. The deceased, by his sterling character and kind ways, was loved by all who knew him. He was a member of the local church, and was a sincere and devoted member of the same. The funeral will be held from the late residence on Friday afternoon at two o'clock. Interment will take place in Hopewell cemetery.

Found Bacillus in Turtle.

"Inasmuch as it is natural that every method of deacidifying the bacilli even the most delicate, the finest molecular structure of the bacillus it followed that only a 'live' bacillus could be used. The qualities necessary for such a remedy therefore had to be as follows:

When I had it in that condition and not before, I applied the remedy to human beings. At first I injected myself with it different times. After that I gave it to adults infected with tuberculosis. Later on to two tubercular children and finally, when the curative effects were found invariably the same, to healthy children of tubercular surrounding for immunizing purposes."

"I have found this remedy harmless whenever I used it for patients from the earliest childhood to the most advanced age in all forms of application, subcutaneous, intramuscular, and intravenous even in large doses and equally efficient in all forms of tuberculosis, pulmonary, bone, joint, glandular and skin. Aside from absolutely hopeless cases whose fates were already sealed, the remedy has proven its efficiency in most instances."

"To obtain the ideal, to eradicate tuberculosis, as an endemic disease, it is necessary not only to cure the tubercular individuals now living, but also to protect the future generations from this infection by a method following in principle Jenner's vaccination. So far I have vaccinated 350 children varying in age from one hour to three years. Most of these children were living in tubercular environments and much exposed to infection from this source. The earliest immunization I have made seventeen months ago and all children are well today and are free from all symptoms of scrofula or tuberculosis."

"There is a well founded hope, therefore, that this will prove the right way and the one to which our future efforts will have to be directed." During the afternoon Dr. Friedmann attended the opening of the new Perley Memorial Hospital for incipient cases of tuberculosis which was declared officially opened by His Royal Highness the Duke of Connaught.

Mr. Churchill Eminent Fair.

"Now that these facts have been laid before the House," continued Mr. Borden, "the wrath of the opposition has fallen upon Mr. Churchill (laughter). But I would like to submit, as Prime Minister of Canada, that it was my duty to get the necessary information from the best possible source. We have not got a great naval service in this country. Britain has got the greatest in the world. It was the most impartial source from which to get the information, and it seems to me, that it was not only the sign, but the duty, of the First Lord of the Admiralty, when the request was made by the Prime Minister of Canada, when an important measure affecting the Empire was under discussion, to give in a fair and businesslike manner, the information asked for."

It seems to me hardly conducive to the dignity of this House, or fair, that any suggestion about Mr. Churchill's conduct should be made. Neither Mr. Churchill, nor any other British statesman, is concerned in the domestic politics of Canada. I would deprecate any interference by us in British politics, and by any British statesman in ours. But, when in the ordinary course of public affairs, the Prime Minister of Canada makes a request to the First Lord of the Admiralty for information on definite points, I think gentlemen opposite will realize it is the duty of the First Lord to give that information. And I think the First Lord has given that information in a fair and impartial way."

"Whatever wrath there may be with the First Lord, the letters which I have placed on the table should be visited upon my head, and not upon the head of the First Lord of the Admiralty. I hope to be able to bear with a certain amount of philosophy any observations which hon. gentlemen may make." (Applause and laughter.)

Mr. Pugsley Answered.

Mr. Pugsley asked if the Prime Minister would take the responsibility for Mr. Churchill's statements. "I take the responsibility of having asked for the information," replied Mr. Borden. "And I also take the responsibility of my belief that Mr. Churchill gave that information to me in a fair, just and sincere manner and with a desire to give this House and the country all the information he had at his command."

Mr. Pugsley said that he intended to criticize the information given by Mr. Churchill. Mr. Borden, he asserted, had got that information to use when necessary. Col. Hugh Clark (N. Bruce)—"You asked for it." "I don't complain," continued Mr. Pugsley, "that Mr. Churchill replied to the request for information, but I do complain that he sent to my right hon. friend a memorandum so full of chicanery and the idea of creating a Canadian navy, and that he showed such intense ignorance as would make a horse laugh."
