MAPLES HAD ALL BETTER
OF LAST NIGHT'S GAME

Defeated Shamrocks by Score
of 9 to 4 in One-Sided Con-
test in St. Peter's League.

Duddy Dever successfully piloted the Maples ball team through another game last night on St. Peter's grounds, defeating the Shamrocks, 9 to 4.

The Maples, after a few preliminary skirmishes, opened the happy doings by gaining a lead of three runs in the second inning. They continued to increase their advantage until the game was called in the eighth.

The Maples played rings round the Shamrocks in last night's game. Their batting, fielding, throwing and base running was far superior to that of their opponents.

The Shamrocks went to pieces in the fifth when Perry fumbled a weak infield fly hit by O'Connor with three men on. That muff coupled with an overthrown ball by McGowan, O'Brien and O'Connell, immediately after Kelley dropped a hot one hit by Harrigan, allowing two more runners to reach home.

"Hitless" Haggerty was the only man in the Maples' crew that showed any class in the field. He sure can cover big ground in little time. The way he chases those hits entering his territory is a sight worth seeing, and last night when he followed that airship hit of Duke's to the ash heap and grabbed it before it entered the garbage barrel his former spectacular catches faded into oblivion. It certainly brought the ball bungs to their feet.

McGowan fattened his batting average in great style, with five chances he came through with four hits, one of which was a two-bagger. O'Connor, Duddy's young south-paw, was on the firing line for the Maples, with McGowan receiving. The Shamrocks found O'Connor for seven hits, Knudson acting the hog by taking a two-bagger.

McGowan at first was the star for the Maples in the inner guard. He made some catch when he grabbed an infield fly hit by Perry in the fourth.

It looks as though Duddy's bunch will need watching all the way through the season. He is surely coaching a fast aggregation of ball tossers, and with a little more practice together, they may make the leaders travel some for first place.

As the season advances more interest is manifested by the ball fans of the city. Every game brings a larger number of spectators, last night's attendance eclipsing any so far this season.

SHARP RALLY IN
PRICES IN SECOND
HOUR YESTERDAY

Extended from Fractions in
Some Instances to Three
and Four Points.

A RISE OF FOUR
POINTS IN SCOTIA

Change of Front Explained
By Belief that Liquidation
of Weak Accounts Had
Run Its Course.

Montreal, June 27.—After an opening in the stock market today which suggested further readjustment of speculative accounts which kept in an uncertain tone there was a sharp reversal of form in the second hour which resulted in rallies of prices extending from fractions in some instances to as high as four points in Scotia.

Three points in Iron and 2½ in Steel of Canada.

Smelters, Cement, Brazilian and Bridge had substantial rallies. The latter did not figure in the forenoon trading but bids were advanced to 218 as compared with yesterday's low of 214 and 215 at the close.

The general explanation of the sharp change of front was that the liquidation of weak accounts had run its course and there was good buying awaiting that development.

Some short covering also figured in the rally. In the afternoon session some of the stocks which had rallied around the noon hour yielded some of the gains. Steel of Canada as leader reacting from 57½ to 56½, while Iron went back from 55½ to 54½.
