Y., Sept. 10.—A new workd's record for four-year-old geld-ings was written into trotting history today at the New York State Pair Grand Circuit meeting, when in the 07 trot Echo Direct, the sturdy son of Echo Todd and Victoria Direct, trotted the third heat in 205 14. In the fourth heat Ben White pioted the big roan Easton around the course in 206 3.4, thus bettering the mark which had stood until Echo Direct's performance today. The final quarter of the mile was trotted in 30 1.4 seconds. More than 30,000 per one witnessed the performances. Chief Interest in the day's events appeared to centre in the three-cor-nered pacing duel in the 2.10 pace for the Syracuse Stake of \$3,000, in which Goldie Todd vanguished Senarado and Frank Dewey after three sensational heats. Running a Marathon by such a fleet athlete as Joie Ray, "the West ern Flash," will be somewhat of a new departure in modern athletics There is an interval of eight months between now and Patriots' Day and perhaps Joie may abandon the idea. To many such an undertaking by Ray appears unwise.

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
