TO SEWER TRURO,
A Hundred Thousand Dollar System to Be Put In.

Truro, May 7.—Truro is to have a sewerage system to cost about \$100,000. Plans for sewerage have been submitted to the town several times, but it was not until last winter that feasible ones appeared to come forward for so level a town as this. Messrs. Lee & Coffin, of Montreal, civil engineers, have at last satisfied the civic authorities and the ratepayers have authorized the expenditure of \$20,000 for the first section. The system can be put in by sections and the first one is to be in operation this fall. Debitments are being issued for the money this month and work will be commenced as soon as the sewer pipes can be put in the ground. This is one of the most important works Truro has made for years. The system will be put in by day's work by the town and will be superintended by Prof. Lee, of McGill University. It required 1,000 feet of pipe to reach a suitable outlet from the town.
