



After a severe struggle the shore of the lake was reached and placing Knight in a canoe, Timimons paddled him over the lake to his fasher's house from where Dr. McDonough of Brownville was sent for. The physician succeeded in extricating the ball after which he dressed the wound. Knight is in an extremely critical condition at present.

This is the third shooting accident which has happened in the woods north of Bangor during the present week and several others have occurred in various other parts of Maine. This, too, when the hunting season has only fairly commenced.

The first of these deplorable affairs occurred at Nahmakanta early in the week when W. L. Pond was shot and killed by his companion who had mistaken him for a deer. A few days later Harvy C. Hill liker was shot on the East branch waters, 10 miles from Patten, by a friend who liker was shot on the East branch waters, was walking through the woods directly behind him. It is supposed that the trigger of the rifle cought on a twig, for the weapon was discharged without warning, the shot entering Hidiker's back. He is now at the Eastern Maine hospital in this city, hovering between life and death.

These accidents have been widely commented upon by newspapers from all over

nented upon by newspapers from all over mented upon by newspapers from all over the country and warrous methods have been suggested to render their occurrence less likely in the future. Here is the plan of a well known Bangor lawyer who is him-self an ardent sportsman and perfectly familiar with the country conditions in

the Maine woods:

"In most cases of this sort," he said,

"the trouble is caused because someone does not stop to make sure that the object at which he fires is actually a deer and not a man. A rustle is heard in the under brush or a form is seen flitting through the trees and a bullet goes crashing for the mark. This, of course, savors of crimina carelessness.

"The most effective way of stopping

these accidents would be to impose some penalty for shooting at a man which would cause people to be very sure of their mark before pulling a trigger. If a man knew that he would go to prison for shooting at a fellow creature it seems to me that he would be inclined to be a bit careful. Pass a law imprisoning a man five years for shooting at a hunter, ten year for wounding him and 20 for killing him. Were such a law as this in existance it seems to me that there would be fewer acidents."

Three Men Lost Their Lives at Edwardsville, Pa.

Wilkesbarre, Pa., Oct. 30 .- A heavy explosion of gas occurred in No. 3 slope of No. 1 shaft of the Kingston Coal Company at Edwardsville at 3 o'clock this afteroon in which three men lost then aves and six others were badly burned. Five of the six injured are in a precarous condition and it is doubtful if they can survive. When the men were brought o the surface by the rescuers, the skin nung in shreds from their bodies.

The work of rescue was dangerous as after damp" had accumulated.

The first rescuing party that went down the mine were driven back and two men in the party had to be carried out. A number of physicians were on hand and as rast as the injured were brought to the urface their wounds were dressed and they were sent to the hospital or their homes.

The force of the explosion was so great that it blew down a great section of the

roof.

It was first thought that there were a number of men back of the fall, but tonight the mine officials were of the opinon that all of the men had been taken nt. The relatives of two men reported, nowever, that they are still missing. The recident was due to an employe who diverted the air course unwittingly and allower the still missing the relative them. owed the gas to accumulate in the place owed the gas to accumulate in the place where the men were at work. The latter had been warned in time to vacate, but they did not think they were in danger and went on with their work. The explosion soon followed. The disaster has east a gloom over the little town as the miners had just celebrated the ending of the long strike.


More Earthquake Reports.
