

> ANOTHER STEP TOWARDS THE CANADIAN NAVY Ottawa, July 21-(Special)-The naval department has issued invitations t itish shipbuilders to consider the question of constructing the vessels of the Canadian navy in Canada

It is stated that the ships will be huilt according to the plans of the British Admiralty, which are secret, but which will be submitted to approved firms who can satisfy the department that they have had experience in such work and have shipyards in Canada or are prepared to establish such.

It is added that, owing to the provisions of the Rush-Bagot, treaty preventing the construction of war vessels on the Great Lakes, shipbuilders located there will be unable to bid except on condition of establishing branch plants for construction purposes at some point on the St. Lawrence below the international boundary line or in the maritime provinces.


