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WILL RETALIATE, TOLMIE STATES

Agriculture Head Says Govt. Will Act Against Fordney Bill.

HAMILTON, Feb. 6.—Intimating that if the Fordney emergency tariff bill becomes operative in the United States, the Federal Government will retaliate in kind, Hon. Dr. F. S. Tolmie, Dominion minister of agriculture, told members of the agricultural section of the chamber of commerce here on Saturday afternoon that they need not worry, as the agricultural interests of Canada would be adequately protected. Dr. Tolmie said that the federal authorities, although keenly interested, could not announce any new fiscal policy until they first learned what tariff the United States would adopt. But as soon as this knowledge was obtained, action would be taken, he said.

Revision Under Way.
Revision of the Canadian tariff, so far as it affected all branches of agriculture, was under way at present, Dr. Tolmie said, and would provide for higher protection contingent on the adoption of the proposed tariff in the United States. Having been recently returned from a convention of cattlemen held at El Paso, Texas, the minister said he was surprised to learn that the delegates were a unit in favoring a tariff against Canadian goods. He was at a loss to account for this, as, next to Great Britain, Canada was the best customer the United States had.

Staggering Sum.
Hon. Dr. Tolmie said that last year Canada spent in the United States the staggering sum of \$1,260,000,000, with an adverse trade balance in favor of the United States of \$344,000,000. It was obvious, he said, that such an unfavorable trade balance should be adjusted, and the speediest way to accomplish that was to buy only those goods that were made in Canada.

BRANCH OF PUBLIC WORKS FOR LONDON

District Officers Are Being Removed Here From Windsor.

The public works engineering department for Western Ontario has been ordered to London, which will be its permanent headquarters for the future. Up until the present time it has been located at Windsor.

There are about eleven members of the staff who look after harbors and other projects under the direction of the Dominion Government's department of public works. Efforts to provide suitable quarters for the staff here are being made, and it is expected that they will be in place in time for the early part of the session.

UNLIKELY TO ATTEND.
WINNIPEG, Feb. 5.—R. L. Richardson, M.P. for Springfield, Man., is confined to his home under medical advice, and it is improbable that he will be in his place in Parliament for the early part of the session.

POLICE SUMMON UNCLE OF GIRL

May Detain Man As Material Witness in Murder of Adeline Malherbe.

MONTREAL, Feb. 5.—The police this afternoon summoned to headquarters a young man named Arthur Jacques, an uncle of Adeline Malherbe, last night killed on Prospect avenue, Westmount, by an assailant, who struck her with an axe and before he could be identified. Jacques was at one time a member of the Malherbe family circle. He was examined by the chief of police, who announced that he might be required to place Jacques under detention as a material witness.

BODY IS IDENTIFIED.
MONTREAL, Feb. 5.—The body of the young girl murdered on Prospect avenue, Westmount, last night, by an unknown person, who sprang on her and struck her down with an axe, was identified at the morgue this morning by Joseph M. Malherbe, Clansdore avenue, as that of his daughter Adeline. Mr. Malherbe stated that the girl was visiting friends last night and was apparently returning home about 10:30 when killed. Three young men are being held by the police for examination. Two of them are suspects, while the third one asked for protection shortly after midnight. The man who walked in to a police station to get a night's sleep, is about 18 years of age.

FARMERS MENACE CANADA, GUTHRIE

Militia Minister Attacks the Farmer Party in West As U. S. Sympathizers.

TORONTO, Feb. 6.—Declaring that free trade would ruin Canada and intimating that it was not the Liberal party the Federal Government need fear at the next Dominion general election, but the Farmer party, Hon. Hugh Guthrie, minister of militia and defence in the Meighen Government at Ottawa, addressed the South York Conservatives at their annual meeting here on Saturday afternoon. On the tariff question Hon. Mr. Guthrie said that under no circumstances could Canada afford to have free trade with the United States. Canada as a nation and Canadians as a people would become bankrupt under free trade, he declared, and the next general elections would be fought out on the question of the protective tariff.

Hon. Mr. Guthrie asserted that the Farmer party in the West was started by American settlers, and the organizers of the Western Farmers were American sympathizers. He produced a catalogue published by the Western Grain-Growers to substantiate this charge. In this catalogue, he said, were numerous lines of farm implements listed as U. G. G. (United Grain-Growers' goods), but which were really American-made. The plows listed in the catalogue, Mr. Guthrie said, were made in Wisconsin; harrows, cultivators, mowers, etc., in Illinois; portable engines and washing-machines in Pontiac, Illinois; cream separators in Buffalo, N. Y., and wagons in Iowa.

"In the lines of goods which I have mentioned, which are called 'U. G. G. goods,'" Mr. Guthrie said, "there is not a Canadian article catalogued."

Hon. Mr. Guthrie declared that the Farmer party in Western Canada was not only a menace to the present government at Ottawa, but also to the future of Canada.

BOY BANDIT IS FORMER FIREBUG

Lad Caught At Kitchener After Grabbing Woman's Purse.

KITCHENER, Feb. 6.—Kitchener's juvenile bandit, who has been grabbing women's purses and making away with them, was arrested by the police Saturday morning just after he had snatched a shopping bag. The woman was quick to recognize the young bandit and immediately reported her loss. The bag contained \$183 wrapped in two bankbooks, which were again wrapped around with newspaper. The juvenile, who happens to be the same youngster sent down for incendiaryism five years ago, ran into an alley with the purse, and threw it away after taking from it a small purse containing \$1.60. The boy did not dream the paper parcel in the bag contained \$183. He is being held by the police.

HELD FOR FORGERY.
WOODSTOCK, Feb. 5.—Fred A. Anno walked into a local bank today and presented a check for \$9, purporting to be signed by a local firm. The teller detected an alleged forgery, the police were notified, and Anno's arrest followed. He was remanded.

INDIAN SKELETONS FOUND AT BRANTFORD
Discovered on Site of an Old-Time Battlefield.

BRANTFORD, Feb. 5.—Workmen excavating in a gravel pit in Bellevue, a suburb, found two Indian skeletons lying side by side a few feet below the surface. The site is that of a one-time battlefield, where relics are found from time to time. The bones were in a good state of preservation.

TORONTO POPULATION IS NEARLY 600,000

TORONTO, Feb. 5.—Toronto's 1921 population is 597,386, according to the preliminary made public today. The city has 1,902 streets and 221,311 buildings. The city's customs returns for 1920 totalled \$7,244,255. Bank clearings for the year totalled \$1,412,214,905, an increase of \$1,188,572,409 over 1919. Real estate transfers during the year numbered 25,049, an increase of 2,214.

FIGHT IN BOAT ENDS FATALLY

Unidentified Man Dies After Being Hit On Head With Oar.

WINDSOR, Feb. 6.—Following a fight with oars in a rowboat in the middle of the Detroit River today, one unidentified man is dead, and the police of Detroit and Windsor are searching for the assailant, who deposited the body of his dying companion at the foot of Junction avenue and rowed away.

At 1:30 o'clock Mrs. Nellie Drouillard stood on the shore at this place. A little girl was with her. Out in the river toward Sandwich, partially hidden by the fog, a row boat was seen coming toward them. Suddenly cries were heard, and Mrs. Drouillard and the little girl looked toward the rowboat in time to see one of the men fall under the blow of an upraised oar. His companion, seeing him lie still, with one arm dragging in the icy water, set down again, replaced his oar in the lock, and continued toward where the woman and girl stood.

The injured man, who was taken to the shore and left there, died in Receiving Hospital without being identified. He was fairly well dressed, but there were no letters or papers in his pockets. His skull had been fractured. He was about 60 years old.

RUM-RUNNERS PUT ONE OVER ON THE POLICE

Fake Seizure Made On Ferry Netted a Tidy Sum.

A pretty good rum-running story, which is true in every detail, is told by a man residing near Tilbury, who has now retired from the business. Not long ago two trucks, loaded with "vegetables," were "seized" just before the ferry landed at Detroit by a couple of special United States revenue officers. The truck drivers were arrested and handcuffed and the trucks driven off the ferry by the "special officers," who started for the police station with their seizure and their prisoners.

The regular officers at the dock seized ten cases a short time before, and the "special officers" were asked to take along the ten cases extra on their trucks, which they obligingly did. Up to date the 100 cases seized with the trucks, the ten extra cases, the prisoners or the special officers have not arrived at the Detroit police station.

The rum-runner says that in addition to a fair profit on their haul of cases of whiskey, and the donation from the clever city officers of about \$1,500 extra, which they received from the sale of the ten cases, it was not such a bad deal to be pulled off by four Canadian farmers.

MONEY IS LURE IN RUM-RUNNING

Inspector Lannin Declares 90 Per Cent of Border Citizens Implicated.

WINDSOR, Feb. 6.—According to W. J. Lannin, inspector of provincial police, 90 per cent of border residents are interested either directly or indirectly in liquor selling.

"There was a time when a man refused to bootleg because he did not think it honorable, but today everybody is taking part in the traffic because there is money to be made," Mr. Lannin said. In discussing the coming vote on prohibition, he said he believes it will probably contain a clause to cover the search of boats without a warrant. This will be placed on the ballot, he said, following the decision handed down in the case of O. B. Fleming, Windsor, against Rev. J. O. L. Spracklin. He expects that Ontario will stop the inter-provincial shipment of liquor. Mr. Spracklin searched Mr. Fleming's yacht in September without a warrant, holding that it was a vehicle on a public highway.

DOHERTY TO DEAL WITH IMMIGRATION

TORONTO, Feb. 5.—Hon. Manning Doherty, provincial minister of agriculture, will make a statement in the Legislature on the question of immigration which has been brought up in consequence of Premier Meighen having drawn the attention of Mayor Church to an advertisement appearing in Great Britain: Ontario wants 20,000 farm workers and domestics next spring.

"There have been few who have come out to Ontario under our auspices since last summer," declared Hon. Mr. Doherty today, "and those who have come have been farmers, farm laborers and domestics, and we are taking care of them all. The farmers in Ontario today could easily do with 20,000 farm laborers."

MINISTER RECEIVES CONCILIATION REPORT

OTTAWA, Feb. 6.—(Canadian Press).—In regard to the dispute between the management of the Canadian National railways and the employees of the system, arising from D. B. Hanna's "no politics" order, the minister of labor has received word from the management acknowledging receipt of certified copies of the board of conciliation's reports. The communication acknowledging their receipt intimates that there will be no action on the reports until the meeting of directors on February 10.

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
