Dear Dr. Tolmie:---

Following our several conversations re my request for an appointment as a woman organizer for the Conservative party, which you noted in your letter to me of April 29, I have acted upon your advice to talk the matter over with members of your committee and others of the Conservative party.

Among those with whom I have had the pleasure of discussing the subject are Sir George Perley, Hon. Robert Rogers, Mr. J.D. Challen, Dr. M.J. Maloney and Mr. Stewart McLennan. All of them express the same opinion: That there would be great difficulty in meeting the expenses of a woman organizer, however urgent may be the necessity of one.

This being the case, it seemed to me the wisest thing to do would be to take immediate steps to provide for the raising of party funds. Upon mature reflection, the idea occurred to me that this could be done by forming a Federal Association of Conservative Women to work in co-operation with the men's organization.

The idea has been received with great enthusiasm by all the wives of members and senators whom I have been able to reach. As these are women from many widely-scattered sections of the Dominion, they fairly represent the general feeling and promise a flourishing and aggressive body. I enclose a copy of the preliminary meeting called by Mrs. Stewart McLennan and shall keep you in touch with further developments.

I trust this organization will have your warm support and the same generous assistance and wise advice that you have already given me.
