However, in any negotiations as a result of this proposal, it should be pointed out that the Government was prepared to use some fixed sum, any the sterling equivalent of \$200 or \$500 millions, for such purposes, and it swould probably be desirable to place a top limit on the total cost to be undertaken for each such project.

In this connection, the Committee draws attention to
the difficulty that would apparently be involved in estimating
in advance the cost of a given number of squadrons when the nature
of the new squadrons being formed (that is to say whether they are
to be bomber or fighter squadrons) must depend upon the military
and supply conditions at the time. These difficulties should not,
however, be insuperable if agreement can be reached in principle.
It may be noted that the time required to organize and equip the
new squadrons might prevent the expenditure for this purpose of as
much as the sterling equivalent of \$800 millions in the next twelve
months.

expenditures of this kind from its storling balances, which will relieve Britain of a corresponding expenditure, the Canadian Gevernment would then be in a strong position to ask the British Government to take a much more reasonable attitude in regard to the prices it is prepared to pay for Canadian agricultural and fisher products. These prices, the Committee believes, should be high enough to make it unnecessary for the Dominion to add a subsidy to what Britain pays in order to provide a reasonable return to producers and bring forth the necessary supplies. Thile it would probably not be feasible to establish a precise relationship between the expenditures undertaken by Canada and the action expected of the United Kingdom in regard to the prices of feed-stuffs which would be most decirable to impress upon the British authorities that Ganada would use a fixed amount of surplus sterling for additional direct military projects
