LOMBART CHOCOLATE

In 1760, under Louis XV, Mr. Meunier took up his residence on *Vieilles Etrées Saint-Honoré* Street, near the Du Trahoir Cross, now known as the *Fontaine de l'Arbre-Sec*.

This locality was the birth-place of the Chocolate Industry; for it was there that, some years earlier, an officer of Maria-Theresa, wife of Louis XIV, obtained, through the influence of the Queen, the monopoly of its manufacture and introduced it in France.

In 1789, King Louis XVI made MEUNIER purveyor by appointment to Her Royal Highness Victoire de France.

In 1804, Grimois de la Reynière perpetuates, in his *Almanach des Gourmands*, the high reputation acquired by the "HOUSE MEUNIER"; he declares that he considers it "as one of the two or three which alone make good chocolate"; and in his edition of the same *Almanach* for the year 1807, he states "that the Chocolate Meunier is much superior to that made in Florence and other Italian Cities.

In 1814, Her Royal Highness the Duchess of Angoulême selected Meunier as her purveyor by appointment.

The prosperity of the Firm thence continually increased.

It was in 1852, that the *Gazette des Hôpitaux* called attention to Meunier by quoting a report of the Directors of the Medical Faculty, which ends as follows: "We do not judge of the value of the chocolate of the House Meunier, but by the results which we have obtained from it and we do not recommend any other, &c."

Finally, from 1849 to 1883, the following awards were granted to the Firm:
