DIRECTORS OF BANK NOT LIABLE FOR SHAREHOLDERS' LOSS

HALIFAX, N. S., Oct. 29.—An important decision was filed by Judge Townshend at Yarmouth today in the action brought in the name of Curator W. E. Staver against Senator Lovitt and his fellow-directors of the defunct Bank of Yarmouth.

The case was tried at Yarmouth at the regular session of the Supreme Court on June 25th. The real plaintiff to the action was the defunct bank, which had a total of 4,000 shares.

The claim of the plaintiffs was for accounting of dividends improperly paid, by which the bank had lost the sum of \$100,000.
