Miners Will Unite In Big Excursion

What promises to be the premier excursion of the year will be held on or about the 18th inst, when the employees of the Le Roi No. 2, Nickel Plate, Kootenay, War Eagle and Centre Star mines will have a grand outing on the Arrow lakes. The matter has already been in hand for some time and the details will probably be arranged at a meeting of the committee, which takes place tomorrow evening.

After the run on the lakes it is proposed to make a stop of a couple of hours at some suitable point on the lakes where lunch can be had and such sports as are decided upon will be run off. The program remains to be arranged, but the committee makes the assurance that nothing will be overlooked that might contribute to the comfort and entertainment of those who patronize the affair. The arrangements are in the hands of men who will make their word good at every stage of the game.
