

### COLLAPSED AS SHE WAITED FOR BREAD

#### Sixteen-Year-Old Girl One of Many Who Suffer Because of Lack of Food.

Montreal, Sept. 7.—The intensity of the suffering borne by the Belgian women is told briefly in the Brussels Jobs, which cites one recent instance, which is characteristic of many.

"Miss D., 16 years old," says the paper, "sent Sunday to Ixelles Brussels by her parents to get some bread, stood in the line from five o'clock in the morning until eleven, when she collapsed and was taken to a hospital."

Hundreds of the women and children out of the starving seven millions have experienced this. Weakness from lack of nourishment is the cause of many and sickness and even death are now common because there is no food.

He came here from Watford and engaged in stove manufacturing, owning a big plant in this city. Watson and Mrs. Harry Turnbull of Sarnia and Mrs. Gordon Rutherford, of Hutchinson, Kansas.

### MACEDONIAN FRONT

London, Sept. 7.—An official statement reporting military operations in Macedonia was issued by the British government to-day as follows:

"On the Doiran front there was considerable artillery activity. Hostile guns, which were shelling Vladoja, were silenced.

"We shot down an enemy aeroplane which fell in flames into Lake Doiran."

"The royal navy successfully shelled a battalion of enemy infantry concentrated opposite Nechari (in eastern Greek Macedonia near Orfani).

### BIG GOLF COMPETITION

Philadelphia, Sept. 7.—Never before have so many golfers of national reputation reached the third round of the National Amateur Golf Championship as this year, at the Merion Cricket Club.

To-day's match between Robert A. Gardner, the titleholder, and 15-year-old R. T. Jones, Jr., of Atlanta, is one of the features of the tournament and many experts figure that the southern wonder has an even chance to win. His medal scores to date warrant such an opinion. Jones is the south's last hopes, as G. A. Adams, the other Atlanta youth, was eliminated yesterday by D. C. Corkran, of Baltimore.

Such players as Jesse Guiford and Gardiner White, John Anderson and Chick Evans are paired and as all are top of their game, one-sided contests are not expected.

### CHOLERA IN THE ORIENT

Honolulu, Sept. 7.—On account of cholera in the Orient, extraordinarily strict regulations were being enforced here to-day as the result of the arrival from the Far East of the United States army transport Sheridan. First and second class passengers were required to secure passes before being allowed ashore and neither troops nor men of the crew were permitted to land. Transport officers reported that not even passengers were allowed to leave the ship at Nagasaki, where fifty per cent of the cases, they were informed, had proven fatal.

### BARON SCHENCK

#### Had Many Precautions Around His Home.

#### He Was Head of the Elaborate Espionage System.

London, Sept. 6.—A despatch to The Daily Chronicle from its Athens correspondent says:

"From now on, no arrests will be effected here by the English or French secret police, but only by the Greek authorities. Among those already arrested in Prince Ali Riza, cousin-German of the khedive of Egypt.

Baron Schenk has not been to the British legation, surrendering himself, as has been reported. He stands to be treated by the Greek authorities like other persons whose expulsion is demanded. The Baron's right hand man, Hoffman, one of the most remarkable German agents and a major in the German army, was arrested yesterday evening."

### EGGS WERE THROWN

#### By a Woman During Funeral of Zeppelin Victims.

London, Sept. 7.—At the funeral of the 249 victims a military lorry bearing the coffin of the Zeppelin commander headed the procession. It was followed by a lorry bearing the coffins of the crew. Each was draped in a black pall. The Royal Flying Corps followed in another lorry.

During the procession a motorist started an altercation with the British aviators, but a soldier rushed up, knocked his hat off and escorted him away. A woman in the crowd threw two eggs as the coffin passed, but was hooded away by the other spectators.

There was no demonstration at the cemetery. The Zeppelin commander's coffin was borne by six men simply stating the circumstances of his death. It read: "An unknown German officer killed while commanding the Zeppelin L-21 on the third of September, 1916."

The other fifteen coffins followed. The service beside the grave was simple, the Church of England burial service being used. The words "the body of this unknown German officer" were used in committing the body to the ground.

The sounding of the last post was the only military feature of the service.

### Forty Millions To Be Spent by Pennsylvania Lines to Enter Detroit.

Pittsburg, Sept. 7.—Authorized announcement was made here to-day by the Pennsylvania railway lines west of Pittsburg of their plan to enter Detroit with an estimated expenditure of \$40,000,000 in order to reach freight and passenger terminals there. The Pennsylvania lines will be extended from Toledo to a point near the Detroit city line where connection will be made with the Pere Marquette Railroad and that road's rails will be used to reach the Port Street station. The greater part of the millions to be expended will be used to build a belt road for freight purposes which will parallel the 50 mile line of the Detroit terminal railroad, owned jointly by the New York Central System and the Grand Trunk, use of which railroad has been denied the Pennsylvania.
