

Seven New Senators Named on Saturday

One Labor Man is Included For Latest Appointments; Four Ontario Members

Ottawa, Jan. 21.—Seven out of 15 vacancies in the Senate were filled at Saturday afternoon's Cabinet council. The new senators are: Charles E. Tanner, of Pictou, N. S. Adam Crosby ex-M. P., of Halifax, Dr. F. J. Bourque, of Richibucto, N. B. George Lynch-Staunton, K. C., of Hamilton. Frederic Nicholls, of Toronto. H. W. Richardson, of Kingston. Of the remaining vacancies to be filled shortly, three are in Ontario, two in Quebec, one in Manitoba and two in British Columbia.

A Notable Figure Mr. Tanner has had a long experience in public life and was for more than 10 years leader of the Liberal-Conservative party in the Nova Scotia legislature. His long and intimate acquaintance with public affairs and his well-known ability as a debater will render him an important addition to the Senate. Mr. Tanner is one of the leaders of the Nova Scotia bar and is a resident of Pictou where he was born in 1857. He was elected to the Nova Scotia Legislature in 1894. He is an Anglican. The other senator from Nova Scotia is Adam B. Crosby, at present of Halifax, but he is a former resident of Cape Breton. It is understood that Mr. Crosby will resume in the early future his residence on the island from which he came to Halifax as a young man. He has had considerable experience in public life and was a member of the House of Commons for Halifax during one parliamentary term. He has a wide acquaintance with business and public questions. Mr. Crosby was born in Belfast, Ireland, in 1859. He is a Roman Catholic.

New Brunswick Man The newly appointed senator from New Brunswick is Dr. F. K. Bourque of Richibucto, who is widely known and respected in his native province and has had considerable experience in public affairs. He is a French-Canadian. Sen. Bourque was born in Memramouc, N.B., in 1854. He has served two terms in the New Brunswick Legislature. He is a Roman Catholic.

Of the Ontario appointments Senator Nicholls, of Toronto, is a man of great and varied business experience, who for many years has taken

a deep interest in all public questions and who will bring to the Senate ability and experience which will make him a very useful member. Senator Nicholls was born in England in 1856 and is connected with a score or more of big business enterprises in Ontario. He is an Anglican. Senator Richardson is also a man of wide business experience and he has been especially associated with the export trade in grain, in which he has engaged with great success on a large scale for many years. His experience and well-known ability will make him a most valued member of the Upper House.

A Noted Lawyer Senator George Lynch-Staunton, of Hamilton, is one of the leading members of the Ontario bar and throughout Ontario, where his ability as a public speaker is universally recognized. In his new field of usefulness his ability will be as conspicuous as it has been in his professional life. Senator Lynch-Staunton was born in Southampton, Ont., in 1853 and was called to the bar in 1882. He was chairman of the N. T. R. board of investigation 1912.

Senator Robertson is a prominent member of one of the great railway labor organizations, the Order of Railroad Telegraphers, and is held in high regard by all who know him for the ability which characterizes his activities in all questions arising between great railway corporations and their employees.

Recently his good offices were placed at the services of both parties in a serious dispute between the C. P. R. and a large number of its employees in the West. Both parties to the controversy assured the Government that Mr. Robertson's services in this dispute were exceedingly valuable and aided greatly in the settlement which was eventually reached.

Mr. Robertson's presence in the Senate is an evidence of the considerations which doubtless will be accorded to labor interests in making further appointments. Senator Robertson was born in the Maritime Provinces, and early in life entered the employ of the C.P.R. as telegrapher. He resigned from that company on being elected vice-president of his union. He is about 48 years of age.

Laymen and Church Union
