

Threat Against Her Neutrality by Germany Only a Clumsy Bluff

TROOPS

Rotterdam, Feb. 11.—I received accurate information regrading the so-called German threat against the Dutch frontier. My informant said: "It is perfectly true that towns and villages on the Dutch frontier are now crowded with troops. Emmerich, which usually has 300 now has three regiments. They are not lighting troops, but mostly old and fighting 'troops, but mostly old and second class. They are a rotten lot, but numerous. It is repeatedly asked what they are doing. 
