

WHAT CANADIANS HAVE DONE

from the address of M Viviani's address before the Canadian Parliament has been translated from the Hansard re-port. Here it is:

"Yes, you Canadians, mingled with English and French troops without distinction of race or distinction of country, under different standards, have shown the same bravery. And let us not forget that in the month of April, 1916, at Ypres, in the north of France, quite close to Belgium, in that region desolated by floods, after the terrible executive distinctions of the formula of the country and the country an assault delivered by the German sol-diers by means of asphyxiating gas — that Germany which has derailed science, and which instead of bringing all its blessings to humanity caused to be cast on all its evils and its crimes— it was the Canadian soldiers who in that it was the Canadian soldiers who in that terrible day rose up and saved the day. And in many a combat and in numer-ous and recent victories they have stood firm. We see yet your younger men, alert, agile, courageous, under this colors the first to scale the Vimy Ridge, which had been reputed impregnable. Honce to all these soldiers; let us plously in-tering the soldiers; let us plously in-tering the soldiers; let us plously incline out thoughts before those who fight, before those who suffer, before those who have died. They knew well what they did and wy they left your land.
