**UNNECESSARY EXPENDITURE**  
**Government is Reckless With Public Money--Appoint Four Game Guardians When Police Duty Costs Province \$75,000 Annually**

March 25. At the morning sitting of the House there was a long discussion on bill 23, to amend the game ordinance with regard to issuing game licenses. Mr. Haultain contended that the remedy for the abuse of this privilege should not be found in cancellation of the privilege to American non-residents, because we have such a large American population here, and they should have the privilege of inviting their friends over the line for a few days shooting.

With regard to appointing four paid game guardians, Mr. Haultain contended that if the province is getting value for the \$75,000 annually expended on the R.N.W.M. Police there is no necessity for extra law guardians, and he believed that the police are doing their duty and they are all the protection needed at present.

The point was raised with regard to the necessity for unpaid game guardians throughout the country, but Mr. Haultain pointed out that there is a vast difference between having men throughout the province who are interested in the preservation of game looking after the law with the assistance of the police, and having four paid officials who cannot possibly attend to the enforcement of the game laws.

If the government had kept its promise to this country we would not now have to pay the \$75,000 annually for the R.N.W.M.P., but in paying that amount we are paying enough for the effective enforcement of the law, and this law should not be singled out among all the other laws for the extra police duty.

Mr. Langley said that the appointment of the four officials would "quicken the public conscience in this respect."

Mr. Haultain disapproved of the insinuation that public sentiment is weak with regard to respect for the game laws.

On the opening of the sitting, Mr. Calder introduced a bill to amend the hall insurance ordinance.

**JAS. J. HILL'S AGENT TALKS TO MEMBERS**

T. C. Norris, M. P. P. for Lansdowne who Purchased Right of way Throughout Manitoba Shows Plans to Committee of Legislature Here

Important information was handed out before the legislative committee on private bills and railways on Monday afternoon when T. C. Norris, M.P.P. for Lansdowne, Manitoba appeared on behalf of the interest behind the Saskatchewan Central Railway Company's bill presented to the House for amendment. The company desires the privilege of running branch lines from points on their main line in northerly and northwesterly directions touching at C.P.R. points or crossing the C.P.R. main line.

J. H. Sheppard, M.L.A., for Moose Jaw District, had charge of the bill, but Mr. Norris, representing the people behind the project produced the proposed plan of survey and answered all questions on behalf of the concern. He stated that while he would rather not name all points where the railway line would touch, he could say that they proposed to come into competition with other lines at Whitewood, Broadview, Wolsely, Indian Head, Regina and Moose Jaw. Mr. Norris was favorable to the bill being amended to provide that all branch lines powers not exercised within five years will lapse at that time, the company to apply to the legislature for renewal at the end of that time if they desire to proceed with construction.

The main line of the proposed line continues from the Manitoba boundary westerly through the southern part of the Cannington district, and on through Willow Bunch, thence westerly to Alberta. North lines are projected according to plans from a point on the main line south of Regina in a northerly and westerly direction through the Goose Lake country.

In conversation with The West after the committee rose, Mr. Norris said that he was hardly in a position at present to make announcement as to the definite details of the company's scheme, but he had no hesitation in admitting that he negotiated the right of way through Manitoba for the Hill line, which the Saskatchewan Central is a continuation of through this province.

atchewan Club bill, the Jury bill, the Saskatchewan club bill, the Elks club of Saskatoon, the legal professions bill and the public health act.

Mr. Motherwell proposed a new section providing that no person shall at any time between the first day of November of one year and the first day of April following destroy the houses of any muskrat or a beaver dam.

There was a division on clause 4 which fixes the close season on all snipe, plover and curlew up to Sept. 1st. This was done to suppress the temptation to shoot large game out of season. This provision was adopted.

The agricultural societies act went into committee and was reported with amendments.

Afternoon Sitting

The committee on private bills and railways delayed the house till four o'clock, when Mr. Speaker took the chair. The business before this committee was respecting the Saskatchewan Central Railway, and the Hudson's Bay Insurance Co. Mr. Bathwell, representing the Hudson's Bay Co. appeared before the committee, and protested against the fire insurance company using the name of the well known old trading concern of historic fame.

P. McAra, Jr., appeared as an insurance representative, objecting to the misuse of the name to get business from the men who thought that the concern was a branch of the old Hudson's Bay Co.

Messrs. Burg and Parrell appeared for the insurance company and claimed that their business interests should not be disturbed after nearly two years operation. The headquarters of the company are at Moose Jav.

On re-assembling the first business was a motion by Mr. Langley to revert to a former order of business, and he introduced a bill to incorporate the town of Whitewood.

Mr. Sutherland for the private bills committee reported the Saskatchewan Central Railway bill and for the committee on law amendments and municipal law reported bills No. 27 and 37, which were placed on the order paper, and went to committee of the whole.
