Freich Think He Helped Steal Their Wonderful fun Secret in Paris,

Using as His Tool a Young British Diplomatic Spy, Who has Ekipped.

Paris, Nov. 17 .- The following extraordinary statement is given prominence in La Presse: "A personage who claims to be thoroughly acquainted with what is going on behind the scenes in the matter of the divulgence of the secrets of the latest French field gun to the United States makes the following statement:

"This affair is connected with the sudden departure for Gibraltar of an officer of the United States navy, who was employed in the foreign section of the exhibition, after having fulfilled his functions as naval attache at the embassy. The field gun incident was also the cause of a sudden handing over of the affairs of the embassy to the first secretary by Gen. Horace Porter and his departure for Spain.
