USED THEIR BIG GUNS

French and Spanish Warships Bombard Moroccan Port.

Many Tribesmen Killed or Wounded -Shore Forts Return Fire on Ships -Seven French Sailors Wounded-Troops Hurrying to the Scene-Battery Reduced to Ruins-Fighting in the Streets.

Tangier, Aug. 7.—The French cruiser Galilee was bombarding the Moorish quarter of Casabianca and the neighborhood of the city when the last steamer, which has just arrived here, left that port.

According to a semi-official account the commander of the Galilee asked for permission to land a gnard of sailors to protect the French consultate, which was granted, but while the guard was proceeding to the consultate they were fired upon in the streets, and six bluejackets and an ensign were wounded.

The French cleared the streets at the point of the bayonet, killing many of the Moors. On arriving at the consulate the guard signalled news of the incident to the Galilee and the French ship notified the Spanish cruiser, which landed a guard for the consulate of Spain.

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
