Obituary.

There passed away on Sept. 4 at Acadia Lodge, Wolfville, the residence of her son-in-law, Mr. J. M. Gormley, Mrs. Susan Reid, widow of Joseph Reid and last surviving child of the late Judah Bishop of Hinton. She had almost completed her 66th year. Of vigorous character and active habits, she kept her faculties unimpaired to the end of her long and beautiful life, and bore her painful illness of five months duration with unselfish fortitude. Her husband and her only son died eighteen and twenty-five years ago, respectively. She leaves to mourn her loss two daughters, both resident in Wolfville, Mrs. R. H. Foster and Mrs. C. M. Gormley, with the latter of whom she made her home for many years; also five grandchildren and nine great-grandchildren.

The funeral services, at which there was a very large attendance, were conducted by an old pastor of Mrs. Reid's, the Rev. Maynard Freeman, now residing in Wolfville, and the Rev. N. A. Harkness, pastor of the Wolfville Baptist church. At the service held in the house, 'One Sweetly Solemn Thought' and 'Lead Kindly Light' were beautifully sung, the first by Miss Ross, of Truro, N. S., the second by Miss Louisa Hogan, of Bournewood, England. The interment took place at Gaspereau.

Red Cross Notes.

Financial statement for August—Amount on deposit, \$158.51; receipts, \$94.59; expenditures, \$59.77. Proceeds from a Lawn Party given by Mrs. Palufer, of Greenwick, amounted to \$16.00, which we wish to acknowledge with thanks.

The Kentville Red Cross received a cheque from the Chantanooga Association of Pennsylvania for \$48.50. As nine of the thirty guarantors were from Wolfville, they very kindly sent our Society the pro rata share of the money—\$14.55, which we have much pleasure in acknowledging.

A package of French Relief work containing 46 garments was sent to Halifax Sept. 4th.

We ask that all Red Cross sewing and knitting now out be finished and returned to the room not later than Sept. 25th, in time for the final packing before the annual meeting which will be held Sept. 30th.

The call has come for Christmas stockings for the hospitals and as many in Wolfville as possible are asked to fill one. They can be obtained at the Red Cross room Monday, next, Sept. 16th, if we are requested to return them the following Monday as they have to be in Halifax Oct. 1st. Please do not put old books, magazines, or money in the stockings.

It is suggested that each stocking might contain one gift chosen out of each of the following classes:

- (1)—Pocket mirror (cheap style), pocket pencil, pocket knife, pipe or match box.
- (2)—Writing pad and envelopes, fancy post cards.
- (3)—Cigarettes, tobacco.
- (4)—Candies, chewing gum, maple sugar.
- (5)—Handkerchiefs, necktie, socks.
- (6)—Game, puzzle, mouth organ.
- (7)—Toilet requisites such as soap, toilet powder, tooth paste, pin cushion.
- (8)—Packets of raisins, dates or figs, nuts.

The total cost of each stocking should not exceed \$3.00.

Do not put in sticky candy or flimsy packet of insect powder, or matches.

Sheep Pay Best of all Live Stock in Nova Scotia

High Prices for Wool and Mutton are assured for some years After the War Now is the Time to Increase Nova Scotia Flocks, Keep Your Ewe Lambs

If you have more than you need induce your neighbours to purchase them for breeding purposes. Do not sell them to the butcher unless you cannot help.

1918 legislation requires the compulsory taxation of every dog in Nova Scotia and provides for paying compensation to owners of sheep destroyed by dogs, the owners of which are known. Now let every farmer who can, help meet war demands by keeping sheep.

The Nova Scotia Department of Agriculture in co-operation with the Live Stock Division of the Dominion Department of Agriculture, announce the following policies:

- 1.—Several hundred selected grade ewe lambs will be secured and shipped at cost, high class have been purchased and will be sold at cost, unregistered ram ewes at slightly higher than butchery prices.
- 2.—The Department will pay transportation on these ewe lambs from place of purchase to destination.
- 3.—If parties wishing to secure ewe lambs for breeding purposes will write the Nova Scotia Department of Agriculture, Truro, they will get advice relative to price and other particulars. If all lambs already secured are disposed of, an effort will be made to purchase more. Get orders in early, as later prices may be higher.
- 4.—The Live Stock Division of the Federal Department of Agriculture will assist as heretofore the distribution of pure bred rams.
- 5.—To supplement the distribution of pure bred rams, the Provincial Department of Agriculture will secure and ship at cost, high class unregistered ram ewes at slightly higher than butchery prices.
