Sixty-two Bushels.

Mr. L. H. Jelliff has just completed threshing a measured ten acres of his land and the sum total for the same was 626 bushels of No. 1 Hard Wheat. The threshing was done by Mr. Thomas Woolford, president of the Alberta Farmer's Association and the affidavits of both can be had testifying that the yield was exactly as stated above.

Three Daily Trains.

Last Wednesday we had three trains at the Cardston station. Besides the regular passenger train we had two stock trains. It speaks well for Cardston to load up 50 cars with cattle. That is a pretty decent little load for a small town. If you doubt the business activity along the A. R. and I. just take a trip down the line some fine day. Between Magrath and Raymond there are two trains every day—one hauling beets to the factory. It is by far the busiest line in Western Canada and things are looking good.

New Bridges.

Mr. R. J. Gordon, Provincial Surveyor, was in town on Tuesday and Wednesday. He had just returned from surveying site for a bridge across the Belly River. The site selected is just above the old ford at the Home Ranch and will be a span of 100 feet. This will be a great convenience to the people living on the other side of the river. Mr. Gordon will recommend the erection of this bridge.

Mr. Wolsey has material on hand for the construction of five bridges between here and Caldwell and work on the same will be commenced at once.

Cardston Heads the List.

(Farm and Ranch Review.) Last year there were seven agricultural societies took up the work, and between them 40 fields of wheat and 15 of oats competed. This year the competing societies have been increased to 10, with 86 fields of wheat and 27 of oats.

Cardston had the largest number of entries in the province, and from what we can gather the largest in the West. Thirty two fields of wheat were judged, and out of that number 14 went over 80 per cent out of a possible hundred, after being scored rather severely by Mr. W. C. McKillican, who has charge of the Dominion seed branch work for Alberta and B. C. One noticeable feature of the Cardston competition was that Alberta Red winter wheat took first five placings, Preston coming 6th with a score of 88 1/2, the next three again being Alberta Red, with Preston tenth, followed by five more Alberta Red samples, then came soft wheat, Preston and White Fife in order named, followed by New Zealand, Alberta Red (several samples,) and Preston. There were no fields of Red Fife competed, which seems rather strange, even allowing that winter wheat predominates in the southern portion of the province. What spring wheat did compete was chiefly Preston.

The fields on the average were cleaner than a year ago, this being especially noticeable where it was the second competition, but the greatest improvement was along the line of less smut. There was also improvement in purity; still

there is room for much more. Each society gave at least \$100, 30 as prize money, and where only wheat competitions were held a very common distribution of prize money was 1st, \$10; 2nd, \$30; 3rd \$20; and 4th, \$10; or where oats and wheat were being competed for, the prizes were usually \$25, \$15 and \$10 for each of these cereals.
