

THE BASE BALL MATCH.

A Most Exciting Game which Ends in a Score of 3 to 2 on the Ninth Inning.

Although the base ball match was announced to commence at 10 o'clock, it was just 11 when the Toronto players, who reached the city by the 9.45 train, took their places. By that time quite a number of spectators had arrived, as considerable interest was centred in the game, owing to the fact that the visiting club had made additions to their nine which materially strengthened them. The Toronto men were greeted with the usual reception on entering the field. After a little time, Mr. Paulin, of the Maple Leafs, was chosen umpire, and the game commenced with the visiting club at the bat. The game throughout was a most exciting one, and the interest taken was kept till the close.

Toronto—In the first innings the Thompsons quickly retired, one on foul, the other on three strikes; O'Neil got his 1st base on an error, 2nd and 3rd on passed balls, and home on a wild pitch; McKinley retired on three strikes—one run in.

Guelph—Hunter retired on 1st; Blocker got his first base on balls, got safe to 2nd, although the Toronto man hit a lot of times to put him out if he had not dropped the ball; he endeavored to reach the 3rd on passed ball but failed; Hower retired on a foul—no run.

Toronto—In the 2nd innings Wilson and Galloway retired on three strikes; Jeffers got to 1st, but Gibb follows and raises a fly to Smith, who drops it, but succeeds in fielding it in time to put Jeffers out on 2nd—no run.

Guelph—Hood gets his 1st base on balls, but is run out between bases while endeavoring to reach 2nd; W. Smith gets his 1st base on balls, 2nd on a passed ball, and home on wild throwing, during which there was considerable amusement and excitement; Hower retires on three strikes; Montjoy got his 1st base on balls, 2nd and 3rd on errors; Dyson retires on a foul, leaving Montjoy on 3rd—one run.

Toronto—In the third innings Bell managed to secure 1st by a hit past a 1st, and 2nd became Hunter retired on a foul, throwing the ball down; Jack Thompson is out on easy fly to W. Smith; Joe Thompson reached the 1st, gets his 2nd on O'Neil's hit, who is put out; McKinley makes a first-class hit to 1st, but Smith scores it after a run, to his own surprise and to the admiration of the spectators—no run.

Guelph—Scoon retires on three strikes; Hunter hits to right and retires; Blocker gets his 1st base on balls, and 2nd and 3rd on errors of Toronto's catcher; Hower gets out on three strikes, leaving Blocker on 3rd—no run.

Toronto—In the fourth innings the excitement was revived very considerably, Wilson retired on three strikes; Galloway secured 1st, and 2nd and 3rd on passed balls, but is put out while trying to reach the home plate; Jeffers and Gibb are out on 1st and 3rd bases, with Ball at the bat. The striker fails to reach 1st, and three men are out—no run.

Guelph—Hood retires on 1st, Smith on three strikes, Hower makes a good hit and gets to 1st, but Montjoy is out on three strikes—no run.

Toronto—In the 5th innings Jack Thompson hits to 3rd and retires; Joe Thompson makes a splendid base hit, and by hard running gets round to 3rd, and home on passed balls; O'Neil hits a high one to Hood in centre field, who held the ball well; McKinley retires on 1st—two runs in.

Guelph—Dyson out on strikes; Scoon makes a splendid base hit, gets round to 3rd on passed ball, and home on hit of Hunter who reaches 1st, but retires on 2nd by a well timed throw of Thompson; Blocker out on 1st—two runs in.

The sixth innings is ended with a blank for both sides in quick time.

Toronto—In the seventh, Bell gets out on three strikes; Jack Thompson is out on foul; Joe Thompson got 1st, but he uses poor judgment in getting to 2nd and is put out very easily by Hower—no run.

Guelph—Hower out on three strikes; Montjoy got his 1st on balls, and got round to the home plate in a surprising quick manner through bad throwing on the part of the visitors; Scoon and Hunter retire leaving Dyson on base—three runs in.

Toronto—The eighth innings was a rather exciting one, O'Neil got out on fly to Montjoy; McKinley hit to Scoon who catches it and made a splendid throw to 1st in time to be of service; Wilson hit a hot liner over 2nd and got his 1st and 2nd and 3rd on hit of Galloway who made his 2nd. Galloway gets to 3rd however, but Jeffers is out on fly and he is left three—three runs in.

Three runs are now scored to each and although a hard struggle was made by both teams on the 9th innings—neither side scored, and the game closed.

As the cricketers from Brantford were waiting for the ground, and the lateness in the starting of the game being due to the appearance of the Toronto man an hour behind the time stated, it was thought best by the captains of both sides to call the game a tie and play another game again. Some persons expressed dissatisfaction at the decision of the captains, but after all many thought it was the best thing could be done under the circumstances.

There was considerable "kicking" done by the Toronto men at the umpire while decisions were given that did not please them. If the decisions were averse to them it was their own fault, as it was their duty to get an umpire before coming here. Not having done this, three or four Guelph base ballists were urged to take the position, all of whom refused except Mr. Paulin, who reluctantly acted. It is hoped they will bring an umpire next time, and then there will be no grumbling. In the opinion of all Mr. Paulin's decisions were sharp and as fair for one as the other.

There was a most decided improvement in the play of the Toronto nine, and they have two good players in the pitcher and catcher which they have lately added to their nine. The pitching of Montjoy for the home nine was said by many spectators to have been very good, some remarking that he had a delivery similar to that of Goldsmith. The fielding of both sides was occasionally very creditable, although at times all hands appeared to get unsteady and throw wild. The usual amount of "saucer" and "tuffy" was given and taken during the play, which the spectators heartily enjoyed, and it is quite surprising to many to see how cool a base ball player can be when a dozen street gamins and uneasy sports are hurling their invectives at him. GUELPH VS. BRANTFORD.

As soon as the base ball game was concluded, the cricketers took possession of the field, and in a very short time the wickets were pitched and play commenced in good earnest.

This was the first Association match in the history of Guelph. There are 4 clubs in this district, the winning club to play off with the winners in the other districts at the end of the season. Brantford won the toss and went to the bat first. Dear and Buchanan handled the willow to the bowling of Tod and Fitzgerald on behalf of the Guelph club, both being bowled by Fitzgerald and Tod respectively.

Immediately after lunch Dear and A. V. Lee again handled the willow to the bowling of Tod and Husband. Dear's good score of 21 shows that he collected the bowling, which after many changes in the bowlers, he had to succumb to the bowling of Tod, who nearly bowled him out for a good score of 31.

The only other stand was made by Buchanan who with very careful play ran up the good score, with not out, for 14. Score, 2nd innings, 66. Total, 116. Guelph then resumed the bat, Tod and Lemon facing the bowling of Petman and Jeffery. Tod's 8, 4 and 3 was hard hitting, but was neatly bowled by Petman for 10 runs. Lemon's 8 was by careful playing, but he was given out by H. W. Hill made a good stand, not out, for score of 5 and Hunter was neatly bowled by Petman for 8. The wicket were drawn at 7.30, the game being decided on the first innings in favor of Guelph. The following is the score:
