Made Council Look Foolish

Mayor And Alderman Take Remarkable View Of The Publication Of Letter.

—Other Matters Before Council

During the reading of communications, when a letter from the Carnegie Corpora-tion came before the council saying that the population of the city of Brandon warranted a grant of \$35,000 only, Mayor Fleming enquired how it was that this letter had been published in the news-papers. He said it was a direct slap at the city and it should not have been given publicity. Ald. Evans said it made the council look foolish.

The employees of the sanitation de-partment petitioned for a raise in pay. It was referred to the sanitation commit-tee. The International Harvester Company wrote appealing from a leasehold assess-ment of \$4,800. They claim that they have a fixed assessment of \$1,000. City Assessor Kirkaldy returned the assessment roll for the year 1913. It was tabled.

B. K. Thompson & Co., who have an option on street railway bonds, wrote in reply to a telegram from the city en-quiring when they would take up the op-tion, stating that the Dominion Security had cancelled the sale of \$100,000 work-works bonds because of the granting of the option and that he would like to get an option on these bonds as well.

The Brandon Machine and Implement Works appealed their assessment, asking for a rebate of 60 per cent. They claim that as they employ 30 men they are entitled to the rebate.

The Manitoba Engines Limited wrote asking for sewer extension past their shop.

The recommendation of a special committee on the arrangement of office staffs that the time during which the city offices are open to the public be made up to 5 p.m.

City Clerk Brown protested on behalf of the city officials, explaining that it was seldom that the city employees of the Brandon Machine and Implement Works would give a wrong impression of the work done by those offices.

The police department will be equipped with three bicycles. The chief was au-thorized to make the purchases by the city council last night.

Parks Appointments

On motion of Alderman Carter, seconded by Alderman McCoub, H. L. Adolph and S. J. McKee were appointed to the Parks Board for 1913, 1914 and 1915, and P. McKenize was appointed for the un-expired term of Mr. W. H. Shillinglaw.

CASH SUBSIDIES TO CANADIAN NORTHERN

Bill to Provide Government Assistance to Railway to Be Considered by Cabinet.

Ottawa, Mar. 29.—The story of the Canadian Northern financing with gov-ernment assistance attracted wide at-tention today and was amply verified in spite of the guarded formal denials which were based upon the fact that this matter has not been officially brought before the cabinet council which has to deal with the matter.

It is learned on good authority that the assistance proposed, as at present planned, takes two forms, which will be presented in two bills shortly to be introduced to parliament by the minis-ter of railways. One of these bills pro-vides for cash subsidies on the line from Montreal to Port Arthur and on various branch lines for which subsidies have not already been granted. The other bill provides for a straight loan to the Canadian Northern. Both bills have been drafted, but the amount in each bill is as yet left blank pending an accurate estimate in the case of the subsidy bill.

In the case of the bill granting the loan the amount is left blank pending further negotiations. Sir Donald Mann is still here. The bill will, it is under-stood, come before the cabinet council in a few days and the details are work-ed out as soon as the details of the other bill are understood. It is understood that the other bill provides for a straight loan to the Canadian Northern. Both bills have been drafted, but the amount in each bill is as yet left blank pending an accurate estimate in the case of the subsidy bill.

Three Months In Jail For Forger

N. McHugh Pleading Guilty To Eleven Counts, Liable For 5 Years, Gets Short Term

N. McHugh, forger, was sentenced to three months imprisonment on charges of forgery and uttering. There were eleven counts against him, each of which he was liable for five years, making a total of 55 years in the penitentiary.

McHugh was first brought into court on Thursday on a charge laid by G. C. Hughes, and was remanded until today. Today the following charges were laid against him, to all of which he pleaded guilty: T. E. Woodley, butcher checked a bank of British North America for \$10.40.

Mrs. Minnie Duke, baker, check on Bank of British North America for \$16.25; J. G. Kirkland, Palace Hotel, B. N. A. check for \$20.50; W. J. O'Leary, baker, N. C. B. check for \$12.20; P. A. Kennedy, druggist B. N. A. check for \$16; R. Twitney N. C. B. for \$15; E. Gibson B. N. A. for \$16.35; W. J. Coughton, New Pacific Hotel \$11.25; J. W. Bailey \$15.30; P. McEne druggist \$12.30; G. C. Hughes \$16.30. The total amount of his forgeries was \$160.60.

Forging Four Months. McHugh has been operating for nearly four months. His system was to forge a check for a small amount and present it to some store on Saturday evening. Dressed as a working man they thought he was cashing his week's pay check. The checks showed an inexperienced hand. They will also appear to have been written by two different people, two of them being in a hand that looks like that of a school boy and the remainder in a scrawling workman's handwriting.

He was arrested on March 26th by Detective Phillips at 2603 Princess Avenue. When brought to the station and accused of the crimes he told the police they had the wrong man. He declared he had a double in the city. However, four of the complainants identified him in a crowd of fourteen men.

He told the court that he had spent the money in drink and playing pool. Magistrate Bates declared that he was giving him a lenient sentence simply because he had a wife and child who were dependant upon him. His wife is a young girl from Scotland and the stigma of his imprisonment would fall upon his family. He sentenced him for three months and nine months under police surveillance.

TEST LEGALITY OF ELECTION WRITS

SOLICITOR FOR CONSERVATIVE CANDIDATE FOR MCLEOD MAKE APPLICATION TO SUPREME COURT.

Calgary, Alta., Mar. 29.—A report comes from Maclean to the effect that the action of Premier Sifton in calling the provincial elections for April 17 will be contested as illegal. Colon Maclean, legal adviser to Robert Patterson, the Conservative candidate for McLeod, is preparing to make application before the supreme court for an injunction restraining the Sifton government from holding the elections on April 17. Mr. Macleod says that assuming the election writs were issued on the evening of March 25, he thinks they were, the time between that and nomination day, April 10, is one day short of the time fixed by statute.

All in the province interested in the crushing of the liquor traffic are urged by a new organization, styled "the com-mittee of one hundred," of which Rev. G. W. Fortune, former secretary of the Alberta Temperance and Moral Reform League is the head, not to vote for any of the older established political parties in the province or for any candidate who is not unambiguously opposed to the liquor traffic in the province. Circulars are being sent out containing the following pledge: "I solemnly pledge myself, in the presence of my fellowmen, that I will vote for no candidate who is not unambiguously opposed to the liquor traffic in the province of Alberta, I will renounce my party ties and affiliations of whatever kind they may have been, if necessary, and will stand firmly by vote and influence with the committee of one hundred in the election of competent men to the legisla-ture."

No Paid Workers. That it is the intention of Calgary Liberals to discontinue the practice of sending large amounts of money in the endeavor to win elections is the statement made by J. A. Irvine, secretary of the local Liberal association.

Altogether too much of this sort of thing has been going on all over the Dominion in the past, but the tendency throughout the country, says Mr. Irvine, is to put a stop to this as much as possible.

"We intend to nominate our candidates and secure their election through the voluntary assistance of our followers. If we can't do it that way, we don't intend to try by securing the aid of an army of paid workers. A great deal of this kind of thing has been done in the past, but it isn't right and we are going to put a stop to it as much as possible. There is a federal law against the hiring of autos and other conveyances, I believe, but both parties have been doing it and the law is rarely if ever enforced."

For the purpose of nominating a candidate to represent the labor party in the forthcoming campaign, a mass meeting of the labor men of the city will be called early next week, probably Monday or Tuesday, by President John Russell, of the Trades and Labor council. It is expected that the meeting will be of a somewhat stormy nature owing to the fact that the Socialist faction of the Labor party does not agree with the more moderate views of the labor faction.
