

CASH SUBSIDIES TO CANADIAN NORTHERN. Bill to Provide Government Assistance to Railway to Be Considered by Cabinet.

It is learned on good authority that the assistance proposed, as at present planned, takes two forms, which will be expressed in two bills shortly to be presented to parliament by the minister of railways. One of these bills provides for cash subsidies on the line from Montreal to Port Arthur and on various branch lines for which subsidies have not already been granted. The other bill provides for a straight loan to the Canadian Northern. Both bills have been drafted, but the amount in each bill is as yet left blank pending an accurate calculation in the case of the bill granting the loan the amount is left blank pending further negotiations. 
