Mr. Kilpatrick was a faithful member of the Presbyterian church a man of kind disposition, quiet and industrious habits and a good neighbor. His loss is keenly felt by the whole community.

The funeral which was largely attended took place on Thursday afternoon, the services being conducted by his former pastor, Rev. M. H. Manuel, of Musquodoboit Harbor, N. S., assisted by Rev. J. Burrows of Mars Hill, Me. Interment was made in the Methodist cemetery at Williamstown.

## ANOTHER STILL SEIZED

Excise Inspector Leighton and Prohibition Inspector Never seized a still in the woods in the parish of Brighton on Wednesday.
