HAVOC WROUGHT BY FLOOD

Austin, Tex., April 24.—Heavy rains falling here late tonight brought new suffering to those whose homes have been badly damaged by the floods and who have endeavored to live in them, despite the damage they have sustained.

While both Walter and Shoal Creeks are higher tonight as the result of the rains, there appeared to be no additional damage from the floods from the creeks. The Colorado is high here but the city is believed to be in danger from it. With fourteen bodies recovered there were reports tonight of twenty-one missing, although no more bodies were recovered today.

London, April 24.—Wheat brought record prices at the corn markets throughout the country today, the best parcels being sold at Dorchester Bedford and Nottingham for 63s. (\$15.12) per quarter. Other good samples brought as high as 61s.

RUSSIA'S FEELING

TOWARD BULGARIA.

Rome, April 23.—In connection with the approaching departure from Petrograd of Michel De Giros, the newly appointed Russian ambassador to Italy, newspapers of Rome comment today on the fact that M. De Giros will make visits to Bucharest, Rumania and Nish, on his way to this city, but will pass through Sofia without stopping. This is interpreted as a possible indication of lack of good feeling between Russia and Bulgaria.

Russian despatches indicate that M. De Giros is most cautious in his statements virtually limiting them to formal expressions of Russia's friendliness to Italy. He pointed out that close relations between these countries would be mutually advantageous not only in the field of politics, but also commercially, since Italy would find in Russia an immense market.

Paris, April 24.—The Bank of France today released five million francs (\$1,000,000) to the Bank of England for transmission to New York to assist in steadying exchange.

Berlin, April 24.—Via London.—The Nord Deutsche Allgemeine Zeitung officially announced that an American banking group have taken \$10,000,000 of the nine month's imperial exchequer bonds and placed them among their customers. This step was taken to strengthen German credit in the United States.

MADE CANADIAN RECORD.
Calgary, April 23.—It is believed that a Canadian record was established at the two days bull sale held in connection with the Calgary Horse Show which closed today. Three hundred and thirty-two bulls were sold at a total price of \$53,135, averaging \$160 per head. The highest priced bull sold today was a Hereford, fetching \$400. Manitoba, Saskatchewan and British Columbia buyers were on hand as well as those from Alberta.

SHEFFIELD WON THE ENGLISH CUP

Manchester, Eng., April 24.—The English Football Association Cup final was played here today before a crowd of nearly fifty thousand spectators and resulted in a win for the Sheffield United by the score of 3 goals to nil. Chelsea attacked at the start but their passing was faulty. J. E. Kitchen of Sheffield United made a fine effort to score with a great drive from the penalty line but J. Molyneux, the Chelsea goalkeeper, effected a wonderful save. Thirty six minutes elapsed before there was a score, Sheffield being the side to take the lead. Masterman worked the ball cleverly over to the right wing and Simmons, who had only to travel a couple of yards scored easily just on the interval. H. Gough, the United Goal keeper saved finely from A. M. Walker. At the end of half time the score was Sheffield United 1, Chelsea nil.

Petrograd, April 27.—The Russian war department today issued the following statement:

"In the Carpathians during the day of April 20, and the night of April 21, the Austrians attempted to make an attack on our positions near Telepotch."

"On the Bukovina front the enemy's offensive was repulsed by our counter attacks at the point of the bayonet. The enemy after suffering heavy losses, fell back on his position."

"On the other sectors of our front there has been nothing in general except the customary rifle and artillery firing at various places."

AUSTRIA REFUSES ROUMANIAN DEMANDS.

Copenhagen, via London, April 22.—An Italian correspondent of the National Tidende sends to his newspaper an interview had at San Remo with a former Roumanian minister. The minister is quoted as having said that Roumania demanded certain cessions of territory from Austria in return for remaining neutral in the war, but that Austria refused to acquiesce.

The minister, according to the correspondent, added that there exists a defensive alliance between Roumania and Italy and that Italy would not accept any offer from Austria without having received the sanction of Roumania.
