—The deaths from cholera in Spain this
season already amount to over 15,000.—A tea meeting recently held at Cape
Traverse netted the large sum of \$1,500.—Mr. G. A. Inch has been appointed
principal of the Fredericton street
school.—Triplets were born to a family in
Portland, St. John, on Monday. One of
them has since died.—Connors, the Moose Jaw murderer,
was hanged at Moose Jaw Friday morning
for the murder of Henry Mulacki, on the
6th of April last.—The soldier who bayoneted a man
to death during the conflict in Waterloo
on Sunday, 12th inst., has been committed
for trial on a charge of murder.—The emigration from Germany to the
United States was less during the first six
months of 1885 than during the corre-
sponding period the previous year by

last November.—Traffic receipts of the Canadian
Pacific railway for the week ending July
18th, 1885, over the corresponding week
of the corresponding week last year.
Those of the Grand Trunk for the week
ending July 18th show a decrease com-
pared with last year of \$50,045.—The inhabitants of Stellarton, Nova
Scotia, are greatly alarmed owing to the
sudden subsidence of the earth in a num-
ber of places over old pits, leaving
and dangerous chasms. Some of
these cavities are within one foot of the
houses, threatening their destruction.—The fourth paper of Charles J. O'Malley's
"By Mars and Pool" appears in
the Current of July 18. He goes to the
woods when the rain is falling, and closely
pleases the various phases of the weather
he finds under such conditions. It is
decidedly a most refreshing narrative.—The floods in Austria have caused great
damage. The loss by a water-spout
which recently deluged Pech is estimated
at \$250,000. Dozens of villages and tens
of thousands of acres of crops are under
the water in South Tyrol, causing the
almost total suspension of harvesting in
that region.—The five-masted schooner David Dow's,
based on Toledo, Ohio, in 1881, is the
largest schooner in the world. Her
dimensions are as follows: Length over
all, 272 feet; length between masts, 260
feet; beam, 35 feet; depth of hold, 18
feet; registers 1,419 tons, with a carrying
capacity of 2,500 tons.—The barque "Stadacore," 11,011 tons
register, was launched from the shipyard
of Capt. George Pettis, Port Grenville, on
the 13th inst. On the 14th, the ship
"Charles F. Whitney," 1,462 tons, was
launched from the yard of the Spencer
Island Co., at Spencer Island. Both
vessels are chartered to local trade at St.
John's for the United Kingdom.—It seems impossible that a remedy

measures and the seam is probably of no
commercial value.—The North Sydney Herald states that
reports from the Nova Scotia coast effect
that the codfishery during the past few
weeks has been excellent. At Ingonish
and Cape Sable, the catches of herring
and mackerel are also good, but salmon
is a failure this season.—The new railroad bridge over the St.
John River at St. John, N. B., by the
Intercolonial and New Brunswick
roads will be completed in the autumn.
The opening of the bridge will al-
low of a much closer connection on the
through run between Boston and St. John,
and also save several hours time. By
leaving Halifax at 4 p. m. passengers will
arrive in Boston at 10 o'clock the next
day, and the trip from Boston to Halifax
can be made in 26 hours.

menced.—Circus here on Tuesday was
well attended.—Mr. Eph. Weldon and family
left Tuesday for Florida.—C. W. Weldon, Q. C., and the
Attorney General are attending the
Circuit Court.—Mr. Leslie Chapman is general
agent for the sale of new butter tubs
manufactured at the penitentiary.—They are made of spruce with
galvanized iron hoops. They are in
three sizes, for 20, 28 and 40 lbs.,
and sell for 20, 25, and 35 cents.
They are said to be a most excel-
lent and economical article.

—More ships expected this week.

harbor.—Arrived on the 19th, barque
"Monarch" from Bristol to Black &
Co. to load deals for G. B.—Farmers are now at their hay-
ing, which is turning out a very good
crop. The potatoes are looking very
well. The bug is in some patches
quite numerous, but pretty care-
fully looked after, and it is
thought will not do much damage.
The grain crops are promising, and
with the prospect of Short Line
hills being paid one long, people are
beginning to look more cheerful,
and still hoping that means will be
available for the further prosecution
and completion of the work already
begun.—Mrs. Moffatt and Mrs. C. R.
Smith of Amherst, are visiting here

scenery of the fine harbor make it
a desirable place of resort. It is
