ONE DOLLAR BILLS.

Look Out For Counterfeit Dominion Notes.

WOODSTOCK, ONT., June 12.—A large number of counterfeit one-dollar Dominion notes were found here this afternoon by the banks and stores, and it looks as if somebody had come to town with counterfeit money. The counterfeit is an excellent imitation of the new Dominion issue and several bank tellers never noticed that the bills were counterfeit when deposits were made. The printing on the face was rather poor and the paper was different from the genuine. A casual glance at the bills would lead any one to suppose they were the genuine article.

MACHINISTS' STRIKE.

NEW YORK, June 12.—The N. Y. Herald will say to-morrow: At the headquarters of the striking machinists yesterday, a cable dispatch was received from the Amalgamated Society of Engineers in London, promising financial aid. This society is said to have over \$8,000,000 in its treasury. The American Federation of Labor, it was declared, will tax its two million members ten cents each for the striking machinists. Furthermore, it was announced last night by the strike committee of the New York district lodge of machinists that the iron moulders, electrical workers, pattern makers, tool makers and metal workers in general had promised to go to the assistance of the machinists in the event of a combination of manufacturers against the strikers. It was asserted that a general sympathetic strike of machinists on all railways in the United States and Canada was among the possibilities.

OBJECTS TO MASONS.

TORONTO, June 12.—At the Methodist conference here Delegate Jones moved a resolution to the effect that purity should be maintained in the pulpit as well as in the pew, and to that end no minister of the Methodist church should have any connection with the Masonic order. The resolution was ruled out of order. In submitting to the decision of the chair Mr. Jones pointed out that the conference had passed a similar resolution in 1842, and he would like to see it enforced.

PRESBYTERIAN ASSEMBLY

Annual Meeting Opened in Ottawa Yesterday—Prof. Bryce of Winnipeg Selected as Moderator

OTTAWA, June 12.—The Presbyterian general assembly, representing some of the best elements in the Canadian confederation, opened its annual meeting in St. Andrew's church to-night. For ten or twelve days between four and five hundred ministers and laymen, from all parts of Canada, will meet to hear and give reports of the work done during the year just ended. Every train to the city today brought a number of commissioners, as they are officially called; some of the commissioners came yesterday and others are expected tomorrow. All will be billeted at the homes of Presbyterians in the city. Rev. Dr. Pollok is the guest of Sir Sanford Fleming.

There was a vast congregation before Moderator Pollok tonight when he rose to deliver the assembly sermon. His text was taken from John 13:17, and the deliverance was an able and scholarly one. At the conclusion the clerks took their places and the roll of the commissioners was presented. The moderator then called for nominations for his successor, and in so doing briefly reviewed the events of the year, including the troubles in China, the opening of the new century, the death of Queen Victoria, the accession of King Edward and the death of Dr. MacKay, the great missionary. He announced that the century fund had reached a total of \$1,000,000. Subscribed to the removal of the church debts \$200,000, instead of \$400,000 asked for.

Professor Bryce of Winnipeg moved, seconded by Dr. Armstrong, Ottawa, that Dr. Warden be moderator. The motion was unanimously adopted. Dr. Warden briefly returned thanks, in the course of which he reviewed the work of the church. A cordial vote of thanks was passed to the retiring moderator on motion of Walter Paul, Montreal, seconded by Dr. Murray, Kincaidine. After a number of committees were appointed the meeting adjourned at 10:30.

HALIFAX, June 12.—Attorney General Longley, acting Premier of Nova Scotia, states there is absolutely no truth in the report that Vanderbilt's money is behind the development of Nova Scotia resources.

LOUISVILLE, Ky., June 12.—The Louisville railway company will on July 1st increase the wages of its motormen and conductors from 17½ cents to 18½ cents an hour.

CHICAGO, June 12.—C. H. Peterson, Swedish author and newspaper editor, died at his residence in that city, after an illness of several weeks.
