FAIRPLAY TO OUR COLLIERIES.

That evil-starred, but luxurious and costly icebreaker, Montcalm, is still in trouble. Instead of breaking ice last winter, she was undergoing repairs. The other day she got free and placed herself in the path of a O.P.E. steamship, which almost capsized her. Happily, the Montcalm, though badly injured, did not go to the bottom with her \$2,758 dining-room of silver and cut glass, including the three fruit stands, cost \$148,50; 6 dish covers, \$118; 2 coffee pots, \$46; 4 milk jugs, \$68; 2 sugar bowls, \$54; fish eaters, \$90; ten crackers, \$27; ice pitcher, \$64; sherry, ruby, hock and champagne glasses, 18 dozen, \$125.14, and game oysters, \$60.64. As an icebreaker, the Montcalm may not be a success, but as a banquet room she has still a great future before her.

CONCERNING PADDED ACCOUNTS.

Enquiry by a special committee of five members was started on Friday in the charges made by Major Hodgins that the contractors' sub-contractors of work on the Transcontinental had been so padded as to cause a loss of millions to the country. The minority members of the committee are Messrs Barker and Lennox. The majority are Messrs Goffin, McDonald and Corvill, all skilled and experienced obstructors. Mr. McDonald takes the ground that it is no business of the committee to find out whether padding of the accounts is actually taking place, but only whether Major Hodgins has personal knowledge of such proceedings.
