RESIGNATION OF THE DUTCH MINISTRY.
The papers received at Liverpool on the 22nd ult., announce to us the resignation of the Dutch Ministry en masse, on Monday evening after a night's deliberation. The King accepted their resignations, and gave instructions for the formation of another Ministry. The circumstances which led to this result have not transpired.

THE OUTBREAK AT CEPHALONIA.
The insurrection of the island of Cephalonia has gained ground since the last account. The troops sent to quell it have not proved sufficient. The Lord High Commissioner proceeded there in person, and had a narrow escape with his life. A soldier was shot dead by his side. Martial law is in full force—7 of the insurgents have been sentenced to death and executed. A portion of the English squadron, stationed at Malta, is on their way to Cephalonia, and it is hoped that tranquility will soon be established.

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
