Dear Sir,—Permit me space in your valuable journal to reply to an article that appeared in last evening's issue of your paper, and which was headed "An Explanation" and signed "P. J. R." The writer of this article, whoever he is, had no right whatever to take up the matter referred to in his article on behalf of the T. A. & B. Society, as he had no authority whatever to do so, and he simply displayed his ignorance and impudence by his action in the matter. In endeavoring to uphold the dignity of the Society in his letter, he forgets himself so far that he insults it by slandering two of its members. I am not out, Sir, for championing any one in particular but in the interest of right and fair play. As regards the incident that the uptown business man was concerned in I might state that, so far as the public have been acquainted with the matter they have been totally misinformed. I think it my duty in justice to all concerned to set the matter right, and in doing so I defy contradiction.
On Tuesday night last the T. A. Club held its annual billiard dinner, and amongst those who attended was the well advertised business man of the West End who was a guest of some member of the Club, and not an official guest of the Club as some imagine, previous to adjourning to the dining room the gentleman who sang the song which "P. J. R." terms "doggerel," acquainted the uptown business man that he was going to sing that song and received his consent in doing so. The result of the song was pleasing to all except the uptown business man who it appears seemed highly offended at being thus cruelly treated.
It appears now that there is some person so much interested in the uptown business man that he seeks to champion him at the expense of the T. A. & B. Society. If "P. J. R." is a member of the T. A. & B. Society he could not but be acquainted with the facts of the case, then why not he come out over his own signature like a man, if he was honorably inclined. The fact is, Mr. Editor, "P. J. R." wanted to have a slap at the two members of the Society and in the meantime solicit the sympathy of the public for the uptown business man, thereby holding the Society up to ridicule which he had no right to do. Debate on the Powers of the Lords

Special to Evening Telegram.
LONDON, To-Day.
The House of Commons sat late on the discussion of the second clause of the Parliament Bill, which relates to the curtailment of the powers of the House of Lords, and rejected numerous amendments seeking to exclude all sorts of measures from the operation of the bill. The anti-Home-Rule amendment, proposing to exclude any Bill to establish a separate Parliament and Executive for Ireland, moved by Mr. Londsdale of Mid. Armagh, was defeated by a vote of 281 to 120. Premier Asquith and Home Secretary Churchill, during the course of the debate, reiterated the intention of the Government to proceed with the bill for the reform of the House of Lords during the lifetime of the present Parliament. Mr. Churchill explained the fact that the Parliament Bill, although it would secure the predominance of the House of Commons, would leave the House of Lords with the power of vexatious interference with liberal measures, as in itself a sufficient security that the Government would seek to reform the Upper Chamber. Mr. Butcher, Unionist, York, moved an amendment, exempting from the operation of clause two, any bill affecting the continued existence of Privileges of the Crown. In opposing the amendment, Sir Rufus Isaacs, the Attorney General said the security of the Crown rested in the loyalty of the people. It would be an evil day for the Crown when it depended for its existence upon the veto of the Lords. The amendment was defeated by 273 to 169.

Bailey, and his assistants who made it such a success, and we would like to see our Long Pond and Upper Gullies schools have their yearly concert of the same at Middle Bight. We always look forward to these concerts and hope they will be continued. The proceeds amounted \$17.

Newfoundland - Bought Fish Dutiable.

WASHINGTON, To-Day.
The fishing interests of New England are vitally affected by the ruling of the Treasury Department, which has been sustained by the Customs Court in the case of the schooner Sarah G. Wharf. The Hague Tribunal gave the American fishermen the right to operate in treaty waters with foreign labor, but some fishermen contend that fish caught by natives of Newfoundland, for instance, could be brought by Americans into the ports of the States, duty free. In sustaining the Treasury Department's ruling, the Court defines the American fishery, holding that fish caught in Treaty water by any other than American owned or mastered outfit, must pay duty as imports.

Stella Maris Here.

The s.s. Stella Maris, Capt. W. Winsor, arrived here at 3 p.m. yesterday. The ship went north as far as Twillingate and since she left port has had a succession of storms and heavy sea, but the ship managed to make all her ports of call. She reports no ice north to Twillingate, and the belief is that the heavy northern floe is broken up. About 100 passengers, mostly fishermen, came along, and these will get their schooners ready for the fishery. Their vessels have been laying up here all the winter.

PATRIOTIC CONCERT.
A large audience attended the Patriotic Concert in Bishop Feild College Hall last night. The event was under the patronage of His Excellency the Governor who with Lady Williams and Secretary Fitzherbert attended. The first part of the programme consisted of a vocal solo by Mr. H. Foster, "Englishman's Home;" violin solo, in E minor—Miss Johnson; vocal solo, "Hearts of Oak"—Mr. S. W. Cornick; vocal solo, "Death of Nelson"—Mr. F. Miller. The second part included solos, duets and choruses by the Plerios who achieved even a greater success than on the previous nights. During the interval His Excellency the Governor delivered a patriotic address in which he said that there was a disposition amongst our people to regard all coming here, even those from the British Colonies as aliens. This is regrettable and does not evidence that true spirit of patriotism which should exist in the hearts of the people of the Great Empire. When the sons of Newfoundland go abroad they expect to receive good treatment by the people of the countries to which they emigrate. His Excellency also spoke on international peace and the means by which it could be achieved. The address was most interesting and was attentively listened to.
