WASHINGTON, To-Day. The fishing interests of New England are vitally affected by the ruling of the Treasury Department, which has been sustained by the Customs Court in the case of the schooner Sarah G. Wharf. The Hague Tribunal gave the American fishermen the right to operate in treaty waters with oreign labor, but some fishermen contend that fish caught by natives of Newfoundland, for instance, could be brought by Americans into the ports of the States, duty free. In sustaining the Treasury Department's ruling, the Court defines the American fishry, holding that fish caught in Treaty water by any other than American owned or mastered outfit, must pay duty as imports.
