Morris's Misrepresentation

There is much chaff and little wheat in the comment of the *Morison* organ on the letter of the Premier, which we published yesterday.

The Daily News asserts we have deliberately slandered the Premier in this connection. We hurl back the charge and declare we have not slandered the Premier either deliberately or otherwise.

Last February the Premier in the course of a speech stated that he had never had any interest, direct or indirect, near or remote, in any timber wealth. In June last we pointed out that Sir Edward Morris was registered as the owner of 40,000 shares in the St. George's Lumber Company.

We indicated the apparent discrepancy between Sir Edward's statement and the ownership of shares in a Company holding timber tracts in Newfoundland. We made no innuendoes. We pointed out what was apparent and suggested the desirability of an explanation. We did this last June.

In no way did we draw inferences which were unwarranted. In no way did we make or insinuate charges which were baseless.

The discrepancy that was apparent last June has not been removed by the letter of Sir Edward Morris. It has been fixed firmer by his testimony and that of Mr. Prince.

He has made it clear to the public that he held these shares in the St. George's Lumber Company at the time he stated he had no interest in any timber wealth in the country.

Is not a journalist fully justified in pointing out a discrepancy of this nature between a statement made by a public man from his place in Parliament and a fact which is on record?

The Daily News finds fault with the degree of publicity we gave to Sir Edward's letter. It complains we published it on an inside page. So did the News. The Chronicle published it on page 3, so did we. Moreover, we gave it a special degree of publicity by giving a day's notice of our intention of publishing it.

As we pointed out yesterday Sir Edward misquoted what we said was discrepant, by adding a sentence which was not in our statement of the discrepancy, and on that misquotation

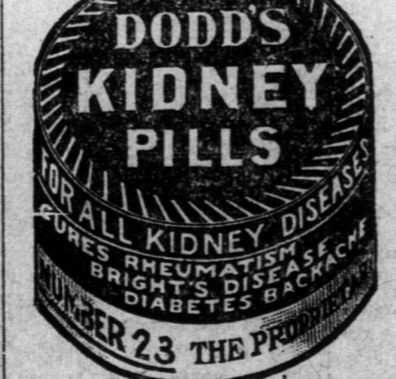

Rough Time in the House of Commons

Special Evening Telegram.

LONDON, this morning.—The House of Commons, the popular House of the Mother of Parliaments, was the scene of a riot last night over Asquith's proposal to rescind the action of Monday, when the Unionists carried by a majority of 22, Sir Fred Banbury's amendment (defeating the most important feature of the Home Rule Bill. The Unionists refused to permit the debate, and the Speaker was forced to adjourn the session on account of disorder. This is an extremely rare occurrence, and the situation is considered a critical one. The Unionists threaten that they will continue to make his name in the House impossible under the Prime Minister's amendment, or drops the Home Rule Bill. They declare his amendment unprecedented, and will be obstructing by unprecedented measures. The object is to force the Government to resign. The uproar far exceeded the speech which he introduced the bill and has not been equalled since 1841, when Gladstone's first Home Rule measure. The ministers were taunted with epithets, such as "Traitor," "Ape," etc. Sir William Bull, Unionist M.P., for Hammersmith was ordered from the floor for repeatedly calling the Premier a "Traitor." After the adjournment, the Unionists doubled up programmes and threw them across the floor in the Prime Minister. Spencer Cavendish was hit with a heavy book hurled from the camp of the enemy. A free fight appeared imminent, until Crook, a labor member, poured oil on the troubled waters starting to stir, and said: "The session is over, and the benches were packed with Asquith's followers, who greeted him with cheers on his entrance, and demonstrated their presence by force by defeating a motion for an adjournment early in the proceedings. Asquith's motion was defeated by a vote of 227 to 218. The subject of the amendment was that Banbury's amendment be rescinded, notwithstanding anything in any standing order of the House, and that the order of the House in respect to the Home Rule Bill take effect as though Monday's proceedings had not taken place. The effect of this would practically be to annul the constitution of the House of Commons. Banbury's amendment was offered by Banbury, leader of the Opposition, and the floor quickly, and inquired whether there was any objection to the Government's course, or whether it would not destroy all safeguard for the regularity of the House's proceedings. Asquith's loud and angry outburst, the speaker replied that he could find no precedent for rescinding a division of the House, and that at during the passage of a bill, or if it would destroy the safeguard of the House was a matter of which every member must form his own opinion. There was a long discussion on the Parliamentary points, and then Asquith rose and said no notice had been given of the amendment offered by Banbury, and that his discussion was brief. He doubted if his members on either side had appreciated its importance. It would reduce the \$30,000,000, which it was proposed to transfer to the Irish Government, to \$12,500,000.

Special Evening Telegram. LONDON, Nov. 13.—The Government has accepted an offer of the Federated Malay States to provide a cruiser, costing \$12,000,000.

Special Evening Telegram. INDIANAPOLIS, Nov. 13.—Fourteen were killed and fifty injured this morning when an inbound passenger train ran into an open switch.

Special Evening Telegram. LONDON, Nov. 13.—A noteworthy event in the London financial markets has been the issue of 4 per cent. Debentures for Sydney N.S.W. This issue is for \$500,000, and was put on the market at 97, and has been over-subscribed.

Special Evening Telegram. DARMSTADT, Germany, Nov. 13.—A fatal riot between groups of Russian and German students at the Technische University here, occurred to-day. One Russian student was killed, and a number of German and Russian students were wounded. A pistol shot, one German dangerously.

LONDON, Nov. 13.—The resignation of Ambassador Bryce and the appointment of Cecil Spring-Rice as his successor are officially announced to-day. The Foreign Office says that Mr. Bryce resigned, but prolonged his stay at the request of the Government.

TORONTO, Nov. 13.—Local military men are inclined to discredit a report from Winnipeg that British Army reservists have been notified to hold themselves in readiness for immediate mobilization. A notification has been received here that the Reservists who number between 40 and 50. General Cotton, however, held that it was possible that notification had been received at Winnipeg, and was the policy of the British War Office to notify distant parts first.
