From Third Storey Window

MAN JUMPS TO GROUND SATURDAY NIGHT—HIS WONDERFUL ESCAPE FROM DEATH.

A naval reservist named Gilliam, of Bay-St. George, was paid off the Calypso Saturday, and determined to leave for home by the express which went out last evening. He came to Mr. Win. Poole's boarding house on Adelaide Street, at 1 p.m., and after getting his trunks packed and everything ready to go away yesterday, went down Water Street. He came home somewhat under the influence of liquor and later fell over the stairs, his head coming in contact with the knob of the door which was broken off by the blow. The man was dazed when picked up and it is thought that the blow so seriously affected his brain that his subsequent action in jumping from the window to the street was caused by it. The man went to the upper flat of the building where his room was, and nothing was heard of him till he raised the sash, after going to the front of the building and jumped from the third storey to the ground. He evidently struck the electric wire which feeds the trams along Adelaide St., and this broke his fall. The wires are 15 feet below the window from which he jumped and the ground 30 feet. He broke the wires when he hit them and the lights in Poole's and other houses were extinguished. Instantly, Poole's was filled with men and the screams of the women and shouts of the men who were aroused from their beds caused a sensation in the vicinity. The man who was partly clad when he jumped had his pants in his hands when he walked into the house from the street and took matters philosophically. Beyond a little cut on the side of the head, he was not seriously hurt. He had a narrow escape from death and could not account for his act. Constable Tucker later removed the man to the police station.

REV. DR. ENDICOTT.

The immense congregation which assembled in Gower Street Church last night for the purpose of hearing the Rev. Dr. Endicott in reference to missionary work in China, was the best proof that we can give of the speaker's popularity, and of the deep impressions that both have made. The rev. doctor last night was certainly at his very best, and his address may well be termed a masterpiece both in delivery and matter. In opening he paid a high tribute to the great men of every nation, and especially to those of the British Empire, who in their quest for knowledge sacrificed their all in the attempt. Notably was this so in the last catastrophe which research has claimed—the catastrophe of the South Pole. These great men were endeavouring to find the world, and had done great good; but there was a higher research even than this, and the missionary and the Christian Church was engaged in this work. Christianity was directing men so that they might find themselves, and then find the best that is in the world, in finding God, the Creator and maker of all things. In continuing the speaker said that the great missionary work of the nineteenth century is now telling upon the Chinese people, and there is evidence that the work has not been in vain and that rich harvests are being gathered. The speaker paid a high tribute to the traditions and religious propensities of the Chinese people, and in all that he said he manifested his own ability as to what he himself had done, and of the grasp which he holds of missions in that great land. It is not possible to report the address in a daily newspaper, nor is it necessary to do so. Suffice it, however, to say that for the space of one hour the entire audience listened with the closest attention, and not only heard what the speaker said, but seemed to see the facts in panoramic order. In closing Dr. Endicott expressed his thanks for the reception which had been accorded him during his stay in Newfoundland; and we feel sure he carries with him a green spot for the friends whom he has made, and he can rest assured that whenever his duties call him this way he will find the same cordial spirit and receive the same hearty welcome. We would kindly remind our readers of the meeting to-night in Gower St. Church, at which the rev. doctor will deliver an address especially to men. A cordial invitation is extended to all strangers and visitors.

Millions Bequeathed

To Relations in Montreal by Bachelor Uncle.

St. Louis, Mo., Feb. 18.—The will of David P. Rankin, capitalist, filed yesterday in the probate court of St. Louis county, leaves the bulk of his millions in stock and realty holdings to three nieces living in Montreal, Hugh R. Lyle, of 6300 Lindell Avenue University City.

The provisions of the bequests to the nieces, Annie Logan, wife of Mr. R. I. Logan, Vice-President of the Grand Trunk Railway, and her two sisters, Mary and Jessie Rankin, laid them on pain of losing everything, not to give a single penny of their inheritance to their father or step-mother. In case any of the nieces gives even the forbidden penny of the millions left them by their bachelor uncle to their parents, and the trustees learn of it, that niece is to be treated as if dead, and her share divides to her descendants.

The three nieces will receive about \$1,500,000 each. The estate is valued at \$6,000,000.

A collection of diamonds, the total value of which is estimated at \$100,000, are divided equally between Annie R. Logan, Mary Rankin and Jessie Rankin, of Montreal.

Another Tragedy

WOMAN BURNED TO DEATH—HOUSE AND CONTENTS ALSO DESTROYED.

Mr. J. J. St. John, grocer, had a telegram from St. Brendan's, yesterday, informing him of a terrible tragedy which occurred there late Saturday night. The residence of John Croke was destroyed by fire and was consumed with all its contents. His family barely escaped with their lives, but his sister could not get out of the building and was burned to death. Mr. Croke is at present in the city, and has signed for the sealfishery, but will not now likely go. It was a sad task to inform him of the awful happening. He is prostrated with grief at the fate of his sister.

Skaters Saved By A Muff.

Fur Piece Freezes to Edge of Ice and Two Are Rescued.

Danvers, Conn., Feb. 14.—Miss Edna West, 17 years old, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Edward West and Carroll Bristol, son of the Rev. F. L. Bristol, both of Danville, Conn., owe their lives to Miss West's seal-skin muff. With other students of the Killington High School, Miss West and Bristol were skating on a mill pond at Danville yesterday when the couple ventured too near the dam at the outlet of the pond and were plunged into water twenty feet deep.

The temperature was below zero, and as Miss West grasped at the edge of the ice her muff was frozen to it. For fifteen minutes she clung to the muff and Bristol held on to her until other skaters, who had been slow to see their plight, had formed a human chain and drawn Miss West to safety. Bristol then was rescued in the same manner.

The Mission Closes.

The work of the Redemptorist Mission Fathers closed with the service for men held in St. Patrick's Church last night. The exercises Saturday night were attended by thousands of men and the church presented a splendid spectacle. The altar of the Blessed Virgin was beautifully decorated and lit with candles and varicoloured lamps, while choicest flowers in great profusion garlanded the shrine. Rev. Father Holland preached a beautiful sermon on devotion to the Mother of God, and many men were afterwards enrolled in the Order of the Blessed Virgin Mary.

Yesterday forenoon after the last Mass at St. Patrick's His Grace the Archbishop assisted by the Fathers and Priests of the Deanery administered the Sacrament of Confirmation to 34 men and 28 women. Among the former were three of the Chinamen of the city. His Grace paid a glowing tribute to the good work of the Mission Fathers and hoped that their labours will be productive of the choicest blessing for the people.

Last night the church was again thronged, Rev. Fr. Pippy recited the Rosary after which Rev. Fr. Brick preached a touching discourse from the words of Christ to His Apostles:—"Remain in My Love." He exhorted all to remember the good things of the Mission, to fight earnestly the three great enemies of mankind, the world, the flesh and the devil, and to pray to God and His Holy Mother when temptations assail, to avoid the occasions of sin and frequent the Sacraments. He cordially thanked His Grace and the good priests of St. John's for their kindness and help to the Fathers and expressed the admiration they felt for the thousands of men and women who flocked to the services at 5.30 and 8.30 each morning in cold and stormy weather. Such an exhibition of faith was consoling to the Redeemer and was an earnest of the virility of the catholicity of the men and women of St. John's. Then was imparted the triple blessing of the Mission, that of the Fathers, His Holiness the Pope and the Blessed Sacrament. The scene was a very solemn one and few of those who were present will hurriedly forget it.

At 5.30 a.m. to-day a High Mass was sung for the repose of the souls of the deceased relatives of those who did the Mission.

The collection taken up after the service amounted to \$917.25, which gives the total for the Missions of about \$3,600.
