## Answers "Shimri."

Editor The Evening Telegram.

Dear Sir:—A correspondent in yesterday's issue of the Telegram relating in the non de plume of "Shimri" appears to take exception to the views of "Catholic Churchman" which were given prominence in your columns on the 11th inst. The epistle opens with an announcement that the writer is a member of the Church of England, an expression undoubtedly admitting a certain amount of elasticity and like charity capable of covering a multitude of sins. In the opinion of "Shimri" the revolutionary tendencies of the German reformer upon the Church in England did not go far enough and refers to the process as a "licking" instead of a "wash" with monkey brand soap called "later" suggestion. The result of his foreign invasion in Church reform has been disastrous and led to the formation of a number of heterodox bodies and more or less maintaining an attitude of belligerency to the claims of the Church and her Divine Founder. As "Shimri" professes to know something about the Prayer Book, the Canons and the XXXIX Articles it would seem that his Churchmanship is not quite so profound as his protestantism when he enquires where is the authority for Confirmation and Penance being called sacraments. In Article XVI. they are thus described: "as sacraments and in the Constitutions and Canons Ecclesiastical of 1604 we are told that so far was it from the Church of England to reject and forsake the Churches of Italy, France, Spain Germany &c., and presumably Constantine flourished in the first named country, at the times of the Nicene Council. This should sufficiently demonstrate to "Shimri" as he self constituted mouthpiece of the faith that the Church has nothing in common with the protestantism as his literary effusion mendaciously implies, the Church nowhere uses the word Protestant and nowhere admits he impeachment as can be gathered from her treatment of the really Protestant Bible published in Geneva 1560 translated according to the Hebrew and the Greek with most notable annotations in the hard places and dedicated to the most noble and Artistic Queen Elizabeth, there is a preface in which occurs a godly admonition to the effect that all adversaries be cut down as weeds, and be done away with, whether they be "apostates or Prelatical persons." This precious Bible full of perversions and mistakes, was in use fifty and more years a truly Protestant version and if the Church of England had been as its mendaciously claimed Protestant Church, according to her own acceptances and consent, then here was the real thing to hand just suited to her Protestant character. Let her sweep this precious product aside in Germany and Geneva aside and brought out her own solemnly useful version of the Scriptures, the concluding paragraph of "Shimri" letter as to the gorgeous ceremonial and aping Romanism is merely an appeal to the gallery and answers itself.

DISCOVER GANG OF BURGLARS.

The gang is said to have stolen thousands of dollars worth of goods. The rooming-house they occupied was searched and revealed quantities of boots, clothing and other articles which had been reported missing.

## Farmer Killed by Train

Guelph, Ont., Feb. 7.—Robert Wright, a farmer, about 40 years of age, of Ashgrove, three and a half miles from Georgetown, was killed, and Mildred, aged 15, lies seriously injured at the Guelph general hospital as a result of being struck by a Grand Trunk passenger train going east shortly before five o'clock Friday afternoon. The fatality occurred at a level crossing two miles west of Georgetown. Pearl Bessy, aged 12, escaped with bruise on one knee. Her brother, Roy, aged 9, and David Macellus, another lad of about the same age, who were sitting in the back of the buggy, jumped in time to save themselves and were uninjured. It was snowing hard and Mr. Wright could see only a short distance ahead but evidently heard the train coming and kept telling the girls to watch out for it. Just before they came to the crossing the train came thundering down the track and the horse became unmanageable and bolted directly in front of it.

Thirty Firemen

Near Death.

Big Elevator Destroyed and the Loss Nine Hundred Thousand Dollars.

Chicago, Feb. 8.—Thirty firemen had a narrow escape from death in the blaze which early to-day destroyed a big grain elevator owned by the Armour Grain Company. Twenty minutes after the fire was discovered and when it was believed to be under control an explosion occurred and for a time all the firemen in the building were given up for lost. All escaped, however, although a number were overcome by smoke and had to be carried out by comrades.

The loss was estimated at \$900,000. The elevator had a capacity of 1,500,000 bushels and contained a large quantity of wheat.

The building was entirely destroyed. A second explosion brought down the wall facing the Chicago river, and a third caused the remaining walls to crumble inward.
