Children always appreciate sandwiches and for little luncheon feasts they revel in the much liked dessert sandwiches, which are nothing more than triangular slices of white bread with a filling of one cup of grated cocoanut, one half cup of powdered sugar and orange juice to make it a proper consistency.

Another nice filling for circular slices of buttered bread is a mixture of half a pound of finely chopped figs, one-third of a cup of sugar, one-half a cup of boiling water, and two teapoons of lemon juice cooked until
